Phone Geoff Wood on 836-8630 if you are even slightly interested in joining this motivated WRRRA executive committee. We meet on the first Monday of each month at the Waiatarua Hall at 7.30pm. Members of the community are always welcome to attend.

The membership of the WRRRA for 2002 stands at 63. If you are not a member for 2002, then please become one, by filling out the form on the back of this newsletter; \$10 household and \$5 individual, and sending it in.

At this month's meeting of the WRRRA ... We welcomed the new committee members and Waitakere Community Board representative, Betty Hanson, then got straight down to business.

Some of the items discussed were . . .

1. It looks as though the dangerous intersection of Forest Hill Road and West Coast Roads will be getting a STOP sign and a traffic island, to help reduce the speed of traffic through this intersection.

Tony Bacon attended the Waitakere Community Board Open Forum Meeting on behalf of the WRRRA, to state that there is also the need for some advance warning signs, to warn drivers travelling along Forest Hill Road of the proximity of this intersection.

2. The poor condition of roads in Waiatarua was again discussed. Areas in particular were the corrugations at the top of West Coast Road, beyond the Community Hall, and also the general state of parts of Mountain Road. The WRRRA will continue to lobby Council about these and other areas of concern. (See later article about 'Safer Roads – Waitakere')
3. Concern was raised at the poor state of the Waiatarua Library deck. This area is unsafe and has been cordoned off since before Christmas, with Council promising that work would begin, to make this area structurally sound, straight after Christmas. Alas, no work has been actioned thus far, and the library entrance remains unsafe. Tony Bacon also reported on this, at the March meeting of the Waitakere Community Board, on the WRRRA's behalf.
4. Hall Decoration: The new curtains are not yet up as we search for a plasterer and painter. We have received one quote so far.
5. The many Council documents, (Minutes of meetings, Agenda's etc.), had been read by members of the committee and were reported on.
6. Discussion was had about the 'Waiatarua Drama Club' and it's facility 'Badgers', located down the drive from the hall. The drama club is no longer in operation, and has not been for some time. Discussion centred on whether it was time to wind down the club or advertise to re-establish it.

Further discussion on this issue will take place at our next meeting.

The next meeting of the Waiatarua Residents and Ratepayers will take place on Monday 8th April, (As Monday 1st April is Easter Monday), at 7.30pm at the Waiatarua Community Hall, 911 West Coast Road, Waiatarua.

Thank you to those residents who have phoned and offered to deliver the Waiatarua News in their area. You will be contacted shortly.

WRRRA President's Report – February 2002

(Only slightly edited)

This is an opportunity for me as your President to review the year's performance. Last year saw a change in the composition of the Board with the resignation of the long-serving and much respected President Gerry Davis. The Committee was grateful for the efforts he made on behalf of ratepayers and residents and the wealth of experience he gave to our association. He was well supported by his wife, Karen, and we miss them. Our vice-president, Dennis Graham, also stood down and several other hard working committee members did not stand again. My personal thanks go to both those who served in their places and to those re-elected. I feel the committee has been very well served by Eileen Powell, Treasurer, Kevin Healy as secretary until his appointment as a Waitakere Ward Community Board Member, Jo Hall, Community News Editor and latterly as temporary secretary, Vice President Karl Nuttall and Committee Members Cathie Wells, Terry Chapman, Grant Longley, Celia Wood-Calvert and Arwen Kencalo. It is appropriate to also mention the successful link that has been maintained with the Waiatarua Volunteer Fire Brigade through Kevin, Karl and Cathie particularly. It is essential that this contact continue to be supported. The WRRRA attended their annual awards ceremony last year.

Membership of the WRRRA at the end of December 2001 stands at approximately 150 paid up members and this is more or less unchanged from last year. Family annual dues were increased from \$7 to \$10 last year but this still represents excellent value for money. During the year, as you should know, we

opened up a website and it is our hope that this will continue to be expanded to provide a means of interaction and information. The site is shared with the Waiatarua Volunteer Fire Service, not merely to keep the costs down in running a site, but again as part of our shared activities.

The Board has been very active in the latest traffic safety campaign in Waiatarua and the Ranges generally. A Committee from the various ratepayers groups was formed under the auspices of Kitch Cuthbert, and the results are already starting to appear – you may have noticed the new signs such as “winding roads” accompanied by graphics. These signs are all designed to keep speed down in the area apart from the reducing of legal limits. The campaign is very much on-going.

We are encouraging a greater use of your Hall as a venue for community activities in the future. We were very grateful for the grant of \$2000 from the Council for improvements. Works done so far include the upgrading of the lighting and security lighting; replacement of the old potentially dangerous radiant heaters with new heaters now installed. In addition we are replacing the old curtains and carrying out internal painting. Careful consideration has been given to possible major structural changes depending on the funding, and avenues will be explored for this. Your Committee regards improving the kitchen facilities as a first priority.

The fire service again put on a very successful play in the hall and incredible support is given by the community to their productions, and this helps with our fund-raising. We were glad the hall was available for them and other attractions could come to the hall as improvements take place.

Our newsletter, Waiatarua Community News, continues to be a major means of communication to our members and gives the opportunity for them to express their views. Through the hard work of Jo Hall, the editor, and all the unsung volunteers, distributors and others, we circulate our monthly newsletter to members and homes in the area. We hope you still find it interesting and informative and that you will take the opportunity to have your say. The website is also becoming increasingly accessible for this purpose.

The Library, staffed by the hard-working volunteers, provides an invaluable service to the community. We could not assist or provide such services without

people in the community being prepared to give some of their valuable time.

Subdivision issues remain in contention in our locality and we have been well represented at various meetings on this topic. We have kept in touch with the Community Board on this and other matters such as road safety through the public forums and discussions with individual Community Board members and Councillors. Through the initiatives of your Board, this year has seen the expansion of combined meetings of ratepayers groups in the area, Community Board members and Waitakere Ward City Councillors. To date these have been held in our hall with turns being taken by ratepayers groups to run the meetings. This facilitates the chance to air common problems in the area and to seek solutions. The road safety campaign is one issue that was helped in this way.

On the social side we ran our annual barbecue breakfast at the hall. This was most enjoyable and each year we provide welcome entertainment for the children so that families are encouraged to attend. It amazes me that we have so many great chefs on the committee, with a little help from partners and spouses, I might add!

Some other functions were not held this year due to varying success on previous occasions but the Committee is always open to suggestions and is prepared to try again. A repeat of the previously successful quiz evening could be a possibility for the next committee to consider.

As was the custom we held a pre-election meeting for Mayor, Council and Community Board candidates enabling them to present themselves and their policies to the ratepayers. Comments made at the time indicated that ours was one of the better attended meetings and that candidates all received a fair hearing. Our thanks to those who fronted.

All in all, I feel the Board has had a busy year working on your behalf. Thanks are given to the Mayor, Councillors and Community board members for the unfailing courtesy to our Board and readiness to listen to us and attend our meetings. Thanks also to Pauline as our Hall Custodian and hirer, for the good work she has been doing.

Finally, thanks again for all the support from the Committee I have received during the year which has made it so enjoyable for me. You're a great bunch.

Jobs for March

- Plant lots of spring bulbs.
- Divide perennials and continue with Autumn clean up.
- Feed Orchids with 30-10-10 NPK rating (Potash), to encourage later flowering.
- Azaleas, Camellias and Rhododendrons can be given a liquid fertiliser now, then no more until after flowering is completed.
- Take cuttings of Fuchsias, hydrangeas, pelargoniums and lavender.

Wasps

Our mild winter may cause wasps to be a problem in the summer months. Wasp numbers peak from February to April.

Obituary; Thomas Roger Vesey

27 May 1924 – 1 March 2002

Tom and Shirley Vesey have lived in New Lynn and Oratia for over 50 years. They had a bread run and later a cake delivery business around Glen Eden for many years and also a florist shop in Glen Eden.

They bought land in Carter Road. Tom, who had worked on the family farm at Pakaraka, soon had it cleared and then grew daffodils and feijoas, among other things, for the market. Tom was also a keen vintage car enthusiast and over the years has crafted many things for his grandchildren. Tom sadly passed away last week.

Weed of the Month

Climbing Asparagus

The feathery leaves of *Asparagus scandens* are what originally made this South African plant a desirable garden ornamental, but it is a rampant scrambling vine capable of killing its host by strangulation or ring barking. In the bush it will also completely smother the ground plants and forest understorey, preventing regeneration and seeding growth.

Individual plants can be removed for safe disposal by loosening the soil and carefully removing all of the roots – you'll need to get every one of the small tubers. Herbicide control (Escort at 2 to 5 gm per 10 litres plus Pulse) is effective. If the plant is over a metre tall you only need to spray the lower 60cm – this will minimise the amount of herbicide you need and means you can avoid spraying the foliage of desirable plants.
