On the plus side, current committee members Wayne Maguire, Royston Steer and Jeannette Ziesler have all said they will be available for re-election.



Holiday Reading

"The No. 1 Ladies Detective Agency" and "Tears Of The Giraffe" by Alexander McCall Smith.

These two delightful books follow the adventures of Mma Precious Ramotswe as she sets up Botswana's first (and only) Ladies detective agency. Using a combination of natural intelligence, insight into human frailty and low cunning, she finds missing persons, traps fraudulent insurance claimants and exposes errant husbands, all in the context of the Southern African slow-paced way of life. These books evoke wonderful images of an African country that is not torn apart by racial or economic strife, where various ethnic groups co-exist with tolerance and mutual curiosity (bit like New Zealand, really). Her relationship with Mr J.L.B. Maketoni of Tlokweng Road Speedy Motors is a source of amusement, sympathy and admiration.

The writing is clear, light and funny in an understated way. McCall Smith makes us feel the African sun, the always close dangers of snakes and other nasties, and that just like everywhere else, all most people want to do is to try to do their best and get along. Recommended.

"The Pedant In The Kitchen"

by Julian Barnes.

If you are like me and hate cooking because the recipes never tell you everything you need to know and the end result never looks like the pictures, then this is the book for you. A brief excerpt: "How big is a 'lump', how voluminous is a 'slug' or a 'gout', when does a 'drizzle' become 'rain'? Is a 'cup' a rough-and-ready generic term or a precise American measure? Why tell us to add a 'wineglass' of something when wine glasses come in so many sizes?" When I read that I had one of those "this man speaks my language!" moments. Although the book segues into a more general rant about celebrity chefs and their recipes, it is still an entertaining read, and for people like me, confirmation that cooking is for other people. Worth a look.

"The Other Boleyn Girl" and "The Queen's Fool" by Phillipa Gregory.

Interesting historical novels describing the courts of Henry VIII and Queen Mary (Bloody Mary) from the point of view of someone intimately involved but not part of the main action. Enjoyable.

Grow The Green Network

Caring for your patch of native bush or including native plants in your garden landscape is very satisfying. Especially knowing you can be planting the same varieties that have been flourishing in our area for aeons. Yes, we can turn the clock back in a positive way as we replace the weeds with eco-sourced native plants.

Now is the ideal time for pulling weeds or digging out ginger tubers as the soil is relatively moist from the winter rains.

Do not dump any weeds in the bush or over the fence where they will multiply the problem. We are indeed fortunate that our council will safely dispose of our worst weeds for free. Phone the Call Centre on 839 0400 to arrange for a bin to share with your neighbours, or for ginger disposal bags.

The ginger stalks and leaves are good for mulch. The resulting space once occupied by the tubers is perfect for an eco-sourced treasure.

Remember to water new plants regularly. A decent watering twice a week in the summer is better than a daily sprinkling. A feed of good compost or blood and bone is advisable if you are using untreated sawdust for mulch.

Get rid of those weeds **before** they flower and spread their seeds for another seven years! There will be a bin in Raroa terrace soon (maybe Saturday 22 January)—for approved weeds only!
