### From the Editor

What fabulous spring weather we have been having. It feels like summer is just around the corner and everything is starting to look pretty lush in the garden.

I spent time in the vege garden weeding last Saturday and even got a little sunburnt. My chooks came to "help" me while I was working and had a great time pecking worms and bugs that I unearthed. This sort of weather means it's time to dust off the BBQ and get those lily white legs out - mine certainly are after the winter, they almost blinded me at the weekend!

I noticed a large bird in the top of one of the large trees on our property one evening just recently. At first I thought it was a kereru. It was making an odd chortling parrot-y sound and chasing other birds away. I then thought it might be one of the sulphur crested cockatoos we sometimes get here but this bird wasn't white. It then dawned on me that it was a kaka, our native parrot. I got a better glimpse of it as it moved about in the top of the tree and was able to see its greenish brown plumage and hooked beak. All the while it was chortling in a sing-song way before it decided it had had enough and flew off, displaying scarlet flashes under its wings.

I was pretty excited to see this, never having seen one in the wild before. Unfortunately it was too far away for me to even attempt to get a photo. I'm hoping our resident photographer Greg Lokes

might have more luck if he spots one (no pressure Greg). How wonderful to have this endangered parrot visiting us here in Waiatarua. I hope it comes back to visit sometime!

We also have a large Poor Knights lily currently in flower in a pot on our deck that we've had for about 20 years. For the first time ever it is being visited by two tui. Again I couldn't get a photo as they move so fast and keep flying off, but so lovely to see these beautiful birds up close and to get a clear look at the colour and detail in their plumage.

I took a walk out at Karekare a few weeks ago and was delighted by the masses of green and golden bell frogs croaking their little hearts out in the ponds there. I adore frogs and would love to have some here at home. I'm going to have to set up a dedicated frog pond though as they don't mix well with comet goldfish - as I found out when I once put tadpoles in with them in my fish pond. If you haven't guessed already, the fish ate them. Oops.

We have a female mallard hanging about with her brood of 10 ducklings. Initially she had 13 or 14 so a few have been lost. She has done pretty well to keep the 10 she still has, probably helped by the fact I've been feeding them. They are now at the teenage stage, completely feathered but still not quite quacking. Despite the fact that they make a mess getting into the bowls of water I have dotted around for my chooks, making it greasy and muddy and drilling into the ground with their bills looking for food, I still like them.

Nature is a truly wonderful thing and I am grateful that I can get out into it. It's so good for the soul.

### Plant of the Month—Renga Renga Lily

The low maintenance Renga Renga Lily, also known as the New Zealand Rock Lily (Arthropodium cirratum), is a great replacement for the invasive agapanthus and an alternative to bromeliads.

Renga Renga lilies are clump forming perennials about 75 cm tall with soft grey green arching strappy leaves. They cope well with dry coastal areas but do best in dappled shade and when mass planted they are an impressive sight in spring and summer when they send up



tall spikes that produce clouds of white flowers that are followed by fruits and seeds that are attractive to birds.

Renga Renga can be prone to snail damage so pull off the scruffy old foliage in at the base of the plants in Autumn, dig up and divide if necessary, then maybe some food to encourage the flowers in Spring.

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

## **PROLINE PLUMBING & GAS**

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## Weed of the Month: Jasmine (Jasminum polyanthum)

Originally from West China, jasmine may smell and look fantastic, but this is one very nasty weed. As a rapidly growing climber it is able to reach even the highest of established trees, smothering and eventually killing them. This is a great time of year to get into the bush to take out jasmine, before the weather warms and the bees and wasps are out in full force.

Control: Unfortunately this is one of the most persistent weeds out there, so you must be persistent in return. Firstly, if you have any on your property growing up trees, cut the jasmine at the base of the tree. It's from the ground that jasmine gets its nutrients, so cutting it will at least give your tree a rest from the smothering! Hand pull out runners and try and find where the larger main stems are. Cut these and apply woody weedkiller (a Yates product or similar) on the freshly cut stems. Ensure all usual precautions are taken (no



dew for at least 4 - 6 hours). The jasmine will re-sprout for possibly years after (I still have the odd n e w growth 7

years after beginning my control). For this regrowth hand pull or spray the leaves with woody weedkiller (be very careful not to apply this to any natives/plant you wish to keep). For more specific herbicide help: http://www.weedbusters.org.nz/weed-information/jasminum-polyanthum/59/

**Description:** Evergreen climber with smooth edged leaves and pink buds that flower into white clusters throughout the year.





**Looking for an alternative?** Try Star Jasmine (a native) for similar flowers and smell.

### **Environmental Corner**

#### Summer is coming!

While last updates were predicting a La Niña summer (wetter conditions than normal), all bets are off this season, given last year's La Niña summer brought drier conditions than normal. So with that in mind make sure your gutters are clear, your pipes are all working and you have no leaks in your tanks because collecting rain water becomes a priority this time of year. You can also protect any plants you've planting by ensure a good layer of mulch or cut grass etc to cover the soil (keeping it wet). Don't weed mid summer (unless you're weeding noxious or invasive species like climbing asparagus and jasmine). A layer of chickweed will protect your soil from the harsh sun.

#### Have you got wasps?

Are you plagued every year by wasps? In particular the yellow jacket? Wasps cause damage to property and native ecosystems and can be dangerous, so we are proud to announce we now have a FREE solution for residents of Waiatarua and Oratia. We have funding for a wasp blitz weekend - thanks to the Waitakere Ranges Local Board. We have 8 volunteers who will be trained to set and lay 80 traps and bait for yellow jackets during their peak protein seeking phase.

If you have seen a lot of wasps on your property and would like to register for the wasp blitz weekend please email me on science-mademedoit@gmail.com. The project will be on a first in, first served basis and take place in late summer/early autumn to ensure we get to the colonies at the right time.

### Pedestrian Guidelines for walking/running in Waiatarua and Oratia

Even though there are fewer vehicles on the road whilst under Covid Levels 4 and 3, there are still some vehicles being driven unsafely and you still need to take care whilst out walking or run-

### Where there is a footpath, use it.

If no footpath:

- Walk on the side of the road facing oncoming traffic (except on curves, where it is best to walk on the outside of the
- If possible, walk off the road, or as close as possible to the edge of the road;
- At night, wear light-coloured or reflective clothing, or carry a torch to help you be seen;
- During the day, avoid wearing dark clothing;
- Don't use headphones/earbuds whilst walking—they limit your awareness of the environment around you;
- Avoid using your mobile phone.

### Reporting

If you see a car being driven unsafely, take note of the make, type (car, van etc) colour and registration number and phone III (if an emergency) or \*555 (urgent, but not life-threatening).

Non-urgent—submit a form though https://forms.police.govt.nz/. The offender receives a letter from the police but is not charged.

If you wish to press charges you need a lodge a complaint at a Police station.
