A little local history

Mary Bendall and the Bendall family – original settlers

Mary Bendall was the only woman amongst the original Crown Grants awarded for settlement at Waiatarua. Mary's land - which eventually amounted to 264 acres - was at the junction of West Coast Road and today's Scenic Drive and ran westwards over the hill to today's Quinns Road.

What distinguishes Mary as a settler was not just that she was the only woman, but that she was a widow with four children aged between 11 and 19 years when she emigrated and chose this remote high point of the Ranges as her new home.

Mary was born Mary Fatt in 1836 in Wiltshire where her father was a farmer. By the time she married in 1861 she was described as "proprietress of house" suggesting she was a landlady. Her husband James Bendall was a qualified surgeon and chemist, five years her junior. They set up house near Taunton in Somerset where they had three servants including a groom and a nurse to help with the According to WE Allen who wrote a history of Oratia "Jack was a children.

James Bendall died in early 1882 aged only 49. Whether the couple had been intending to emigrate we don't know, but Mary bravely decided to come to New Zealand. Arriving in Auckland, Mary and her family went to live in a cottage owned by John Taw in Oratia, later known as Captain Theet's cottage. In 1884 Mary obtained a position as sewing teacher at Oratia School which she held until 1889. Her youngest boy, William Nathaniel Addington "Willie" Bendall, was a pupil at the school. Mary's daughter, Alice Mary, would have kept house, and the two older boys, Edward James Paget

the family and earn a living. Coming from the gentle pastures of Somerset, these would have been skills they had to learn from the timber milling going on around them in the Waitakeres. In time the Bendalls became known for their bullock teams, and would have taken logs down to the mill in Henderson. They also picked up work at other milling operations such as the Nihotupu mill of Mander & Bradley, or working on the roads.

We do not know a great deal about Mary Bendall, but she must have been a determined, competent woman. The minute books of the Waitemata County Council record her many efforts, in person and in writing, to get improvements to the road to her property. A bridle trail opened from her property to the Henderson rail station in about 1887, but the route, its state and whether it was a priority,

greatly exercised the council and the local settlers. A correspondent to the Herald wrote that "the road near Bendall's is like a ploughed field". In the 1890s the blame for this was put at the door of Mander & Bradley's traction engine, used for pulling logs from the bush. By this period there was increasing talk of tourism and the need to get visitors to public parkland at Nihotupu and the attraction of the Nihotupu Falls. The idea of a scenic ring road was floated and in this connection it was explained that Mary Bendall kept an accommodation house for tourists and travellers.

Mary died of "inflammation of the brain" in 1896 at her home on the West Coast Road. This could have been encephalitis or dementia. Of her children only Ted married: he settled in Glen Eden where he was a foreman on road works for the council. Alice Mary continued to keep house for her brothers. Willie worked in a quarry and enlisted for the First World War and fought at Passchendaele. In early 1918, he was discharged because of illness. He suffered from tuberculosis and heart disease and was nursed by his sister before taking his own life in 1933.

gentleman. He gained respect as 'the only bullocky around who didn't swear at his team'." Jack got contracts to metal the West Coast Road from Waiatarua to opposite the Nihotupu Auxiliary Dam (Ian Wells Track). Allen says "he was a good boss, but a tiger for work". Jack Bendall died in 1936.

Alice Mary Bendall stayed on in the old Bendall homestead and was very involved in the interdenominational church in Forest Hill Road. Around 1940 she moved to live with Ted and his wife in Manukau Road. She died in 1943. All the Bendall children are buried with their mother in the Wesleyan section of Waikumete Cemetery. This is a substantial grave with an obelisk and Willie's military head-

The Bendalls are also commemorated in Bendall Lane, off West Coast Road, and Bendall Esplanade Reserve, abutting the regional park at the end of Bush Road. Willie's name is on the WWI memorial gates at Oratia School. The family homestead was remodelled around 1920 but still stands in West Coast Road among oaks said to have been planted by Mary from acorns which she brought from England. Most of Mary's original Crown Grant is now part of the Waitakere Ranges Regional Park and can be seen on the east side of Scenic Drive approaching the corner of West Coast Road from the

south. The small lookout near that corner gives a good view over the former Bendall land which is now entirely forested. There is a Bendall Creek in catchment which flows into Oratia Stream.

Winter Warmer

Savoury Lamb Leg Chops

Serves 3-4

500g lamb leg chops

I cup water

2 tb vinegar

2 tb brown sugar

I/2 tsp mustard

I/4 cup flour

1/4 cup tomato sauce

1/2 tsp ground ginger

1/2 tsp curry powder

Trim fat from chops and place in a greased casserole dish. Mix the remaining ingredients to a smooth mixture in a saucepan.

Bring to the boil and pour over the chops. Cook for 2 1/2 hours in a moderate oven (approximately 180 deg C conventional). Turn chops occasionally.

Talk by Greg Holwell, University of Auckland Thursday 18th August, 7.30pm

"Camouflage and Competition"

Associate Professor Greg Holwell is a naturalist, zoologist and behavioural ecologist in the School of Biological Sciences at the University of Auckland. Over the last 15 years, he and his students have investigated the fascinating behaviour and biology of Auckland/ Tāmaki Makaurau's neglected insects and spiders. In this talk, Greg

will introduce a range of species and focus on two active areas of research. The first is camouflage and the extraordinary colour patterns and behaviours that local insects use to avoid predation, and the other is competition over mates, highlighting the spectacular and extreme weaponry that male invertebrates employ to win fights with rivals and maximise their mating success.

The Waiatarua Tunnels

After a brief hiatus of the above topic in the newsletter due to lack of space, here's a little more information kindly supplied by Wayne Edwards.

The distribution of our newsletter must be effective and widespread (congratulations Tony Bacon). Since my letter in the March newsletter about mystery tunnels found in Waiatarua I have been contacted, from Waihi where he now lives, by Peter Beveridge, son of Bill Beveridge. Bill was a park ranger between 1970 and 1990 who, in recognition of his extensive knowledge of all things relating to the Waitakere Ranges became colloquially known as "Mr Waitakere".


Peter lived as a child in a park rangers house on the flat grassed area of land on the summit that now has several radio masts on it above Elevation Brasserie (this house has since been demolished). Peter advised that during his childhood explorations in Waiatarua he discovered two further tunnels. One is on the hillside above Elevation and the other down a driveway a couple of properties along Scenic Drive to the north of Elevation. This second tunnel is apparently quite long, was full of rubbish and too dark for young Peter to explore.

Peter recalls that when he spoke to his father about these tunnels, Bill told him they were the work of one of Waiatarua's early settlers, Fred Judson. A little research revealed that Fred owned the land on the city side of Scenic Drive between Piha Road and West Coast Rd. On this land he built the Waiatarua Boarding House . This later became the very popular Dutch Kiwi Restaurant which

Bill determined routes and named numerous tracks in the Waitakere Ranges after significant conservationists and local characters. Now, the Beverldge name is acknowledged on track signs. The Boveridge Track leach to the Beveridge Lookout (about 5 mins with from here) and beyond to Mackies Rest (30 min one way). The Beverlage Track and its extension Exhibition Drive are part of the Hillary Trail. Bill was a staunch ambassador for the protection of the Waitakere Ranges and helped regenerate the bush by planting hundreds of native trees and initiating community planting days. He was passionate about sharing his knowledge of flore and fauna and was often a guide for the school groups who ventured into the forest from Arataki Visitor Centre. Bill continued to support the park after his retirement from the ranger service, cofounding the volunteer group the Friends of Arataki in 1995.

operated until it burned down in 1970. Fred lived his last days in a cottage, removed in recent years on 475 Scenic Drive. The Waiatarua Tearooms, now replaced by Elevation, were later also built on what had been Fred's land.

So we have at least a dozen newspaper reports between 1869 and the early 1900s reporting gold finds and the frenzied digging of exploratory shafts around the headwaters of Driving Stream. We know Fred Judson purchased his land in 1903 and both the upper tributaries of Driving Stream were on his property. On the map pictured the two arrows reference the location of our community hall and Elevation. The broken lines are the boundaries of Fred's property and the crosses are the appropriate location of the tunnels



discovered. All the tunnels are on what was his land. *Editor's note:* As the tunnels are on private property the owners' privacy should be respected.

I think there is a pretty convincing case that the Waiatarua tunnels, long rumoured to be military tunnels from the 1870 / 80s Russian invasion scare, were actually the work of gold prospectors including Fred Judson. That said, I find it surprising that Jeanne Wade mentions nothing about the gold find and subsequent prospecting in her wonderful book "Song of Two Waters". Judging buy the number of newspaper articles and reports this was a high profile event at the time yet neither does Sir Bob Harvey mention our "Eldorado " period in his writings on the history of the ranges. In fact Sir Bob mentions nothing about Nihotupu/Waiatarua's long history of settlement which also included several guest houses for people "to take the mountain air", restaurants and tea rooms, a staging post, several stores, an early school, a church, post office and even a couple of night clubs (e.g. Back of the Moon).

Quite a substantial and bustling community.
