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

## A Little Local History

#### Kenneth Mackenzie - Champion for a Great Park in the **Waitakeres**

Lately I have been researching the people who over four decades sional fought to create a "Great Park" in the Waitakere Ranges. Their and social efforts were rewarded in 1941 with the passage of the Auckland 1 i f e Centennial Memorial Park Act.

But who were they? And what was their connection to the Ranges?

It turns out quite a number were prominent professional and busi- lons ness people with a love of the Waitakere Ranges, sometimes going Auckland back to childhood tramps in the Ranges.

Quite a number of them had connections to Waiatarua, with some having what they called their "summer houses" on the ridge between the West Coast and the city.

One of the key advocacy groups, the Waitakere Ranges Association, was formed in February 1926 at a huge meeting convened by George Fowlds in the Auckland Town Hall Concert Chamber. A wide range of organisations, from the Auckland Horticultural Society to the NZ Tourist League and the Musicians' Union, urged their members to attend.

Dr Kenneth Mackenzie was elected president of the new association. He owned a "summer house" in Quinns Road, Waiatarua. With expansive lawns and walks through native bush, he and his wife, Flora, hosted many garden parties in the grounds, with photographs appearing in the Auckland Weekly News. The property was originally owned by Mary Elizabeth Winstone, who in 1920 sold it to Clutha Nantes Mackenzie at a time when there were only a handful of houses in Quinns Road. Clutha was a returned soldier, blinded at Gallipoli, and Clutha and Kenneth were two of the five sons of Sir Thomas Mackenzie, former Prime Minister of New Zealand and High Commissioner to London during the war years. A liberal at heart, Sir Thomas had the foresight to support the controversial campaign of Ettie Rout to provide condoms to soldiers to prevent VD. All the Mackenzie men were big, imposing men in their mature years, tall with solid frames.

Kenneth Mackenzie led an active profesamongst the higheche-



society. His town house was at 27 Princes Street, one of those grand merchant houses opposite the university clock tower building. He was one of Auckland's best-known surgeons, having graduated with great distinction from Edinburgh University. As honorary surgeon at Auckland Hospital, he is credited with inaugurating clinical teaching at the hospital. He is described as having "refined, sensitive hands which enabled him to do wonderful work as a sur-

Kenneth was a member and later president of the Auckland University Council. He had been vice-president of the Council when Hon George Fowlds was president, another leader in the campaign for the Great Park and owner of his own "summer house" in Mountain Road.

Kenneth Mackenzie was also involved with the Auckland branch of the League of Nations where he rubbed shoulders with such disparate opinion leaders as feminist and Reform Party candidate Ellen Melville and Labour renegade John A Lee.

He was himself no stranger to activism, having run a high-profile public campaign supporting cancer research. As president of the British Medical Association in Auckland and a prominent Rotarian he frequently hosted groups of colleagues to garden parties in the grounds of his house in Waiatarua. Newspaper reports stressed that it occupied "one of the most beautiful and highest vantage points in Auckland. The visitors were delighted with the fine expanse of native bush, the fern glades and the wonderful views of the Manukau and Waitemata Harbours".
