


## Waiatarua Community Patrol News

Recently some of our team attended the Henderson Valley Community Day to raise awareness of our organisation and hopefully recruit some new patrollers! It is always such a great event and the team enjoyed rolling out some fun games for the kids, and chatting with the community.



There are many ways you can help us to be the eyes and ears for the Police in our community, not necessary as a volunteer although we are always on a lookout for more patrollers:



Be aware of our volunteers and give us a wave when you see us

out on patrol.

Tell others about us and the work we do.

Volunteer with us as a patroller (covering Waiatarua, Oratia, Henderson Valley and more). A flexible commitment of around four hours per month. Full training and uniform supplied. Police security clearance check and current drivers licence required.

Volunteer with us in a support role. It takes a team to keep our wheels on the road.

Our biggest expense is petrol – donate directly to our fuel account at Oratia Mobil station on West Coast Road.

## Outlook bright for Waitākere Ranges Dark Sky project

Volunteers are now able to use equipment for light monitoring and help register a pre-application to Dark Sky International for the Waitākere Ranges to become an International Dark Sky Place, thanks to the support from Waitākere Ranges Local Board.

The board recently allocated \$7,700 for the Waitākere Ranges Dark Sky Project, one of their key priorities in the Waitākere Ranges Local Board Plan 2023.

Waitākere Ranges Local Board chair Greg Presland is pleased to see the project take its first steps.

"Our board is thrilled to help start the project. Waitākere Ranges Heritage Area is a taonga, it is special, and it deserves and needs our continued protection and support," he explains.

"We'd love the Heritage Area to be a Dark Sky Place where people can enjoy the starry night sky, and value the natural darkness that helps protect our native wildlife and natural areas. This will also make our local area a greater attraction to tourists from far and wide.

"We know that artificial light disrupts natural cycles and we want to do our best to make sure that Nature can continue to recover and replenish itself.

"I'd like to thank our passionate volunteers – we now have a dedicated Dark Sky Team made up of Dark Sky enthusiasts from Te Kawerau ā Maki, Piha, Anawhata, Titirangi, Laingholm, and Karekare. Each of us is eager to help turn this great idea into reality," says Presland.

The Waitākere Ranges Dark Sky Project is an initiative to maintain the health of the Waitākere Ranges' night sky by becoming accredited with the International Dark Sky Association whose goal is advocacy and education to protect night skies globally.

The project is now in the initiation phase, during which the group will need to determine the site's night sky quality, complete a preliminary lighting inventory, decide the site's boundaries, land ownership and threats, engage with Dark Sky International, until it moves to the planning and implementation phase.

Preserving New Zealand's night sky is vital for conservation and biodiversity. There are currently six internationally recognised dark sky parks in Aotearoa. They are Aoraki Mackenzie, Aotea / Great Barrier, Oxford Forest, Stewart Island / Rakiura, Wai-Iti and Wairarapa.

### Do you have issues with slips on road reserves?

The Star \* group (Stickered Titirangi Area Residents) is interested in hearing from residents across Auckland who have been affected by road reserve landslips on Auckland Council owned land. There are an estimated 150 road reserve slips in the wider Auckland area and there is currently no funding allocated for the repair of this damage. Auckland Transport has acknowledged there is a gap in funding and a need to resolve the issues caused. This process is separate to the private property categorisation.

We believe it's important to form a united voice on this issue and that we need to make Auckland Council officers, government departments and local government and government representatives (Councillors and MPs) aware of





the impacts on homeowners.

## From the Editor

#### Hello everyone

By the time you read this, Easter will have come and gone. Still, I thought the following might be of interest regarding this annual event.

One of the most recognisable symbols associated with Easter is the Easter egg. This symbol goes back to the Ancient Babylonians. torical tradition. The foods we associate with this time of year have They believed an egg fell from heaven into the Euphrates River, and "hatched" the goddess of fertility, Astarte (also known as Ashtur, Ishtar, and, yes, Easter). Pagans exchanged eggs as gifts during their springtime festival. Today, the chocolate variety are used in the ever-popular Easter egg hunt, where they are hidden for children to find and collect.

Another popular Easter symbol is the Easter Bunny. Like eggs, rabbits represent the spring season and fertility. The Easter Rabbit tradition originated in the pagan festival of Eostre, represented by a northern goddess who was associated with the rabbit and hare. The modern Easter Bunny brings eggs and treats for children to enjoy every Easter.

The white lily is so connected with the holiday that it is sometimes known as the Easter lily. Lilies are associated with purity and resurrection. One legend says lilies grew in the Garden of Gethsemane, where Christ prayed the night before his death. Spring flowers like Cheers, Erin daffodils, crocus, hyacinth and tulips also are associated with Easter

(although obviously not here in NZ, where Easter falls in the autumn and not in the Northern Hemisphere spring).

Other symbols for the Easter holiday season include crosses and crucifixes as a direct connection to religious teachings, chickens and chicks as a spring message of rebirth, and palm branches which are significant for both spring and Christianity

It's hard to talk about Easter food without acknowledging an his-Christian and Pagan symbolism. Why do we traditionally eat certain foods on certain days?

Hot cross buns and various breads are eaten on Good Friday and Easter eggs on Easter Sunday. Mix that in with a good measure of 21st century commercialism, all manner of cute things like the aforementioned chicks and Easter bunnies, and we end up with a blur of something that probably, to many, means a long weekend full of sugar-loaded treats.

Spiced buns to be eaten on Good Friday were institutionalised in Tudor England by law. They could also be eaten at Christmas or funerals. The symbolism of the cross is obvious in Christian belief but also had Greek, Roman and Saxon references.

Whatever your beliefs, Easter is a great occasion for decorating your home and sharing a meal with close friends and family.
