THEY'RE AT IT AGAIN!

Broadtech Communications have revived their application to erect a transmission mast in Quinns Road. It was their original application in 1989 that really focussed the community's attention on the dangers of having EMR sources close to residential properties. That application did not proceed, but now it has been revived and we are faced with the prospect of another battle to protect our community from the health hazards and visual pollution that this facility will bring.

The planning application states that they will comply with the Australian Standard, which sounds fine, but what happens when the radiation footprints of the BCL and Broadtech masts overlap? If the standard then exceeded. who has responsibility? The Broadtech mast is also in the neighbourhood of the Telecom mast at the end of Quinns Road; is there a potential overlap problem there? random thought - is there a general EMR danger with the Telecom facility that we should concern ourselves with?)

this Newsletter you will have received a letter from Tom Baker that covers the issue in more detail, and also pro forma objection form. Your Association urges you to complete the form (you can add further grounds for objection if you wish), and return them AS SOON AS POSSIBLE to the Community Library, the Community Centre letter box or the Oratia Dairy. The Association will make sure the objections are sent to the relevant parties.

THE NERD - SILLINESS AT THE DRAMA CLUB

You have been dragged from the mud of Vietnam by an anonymous stranger — you owe him your life. Years later he arrives on your doorstep and turns out to be the sort of person you wouldn't wish on your worst enemy — how do you cope? It is on this thin base that The Nerd sits, and the hero Willum goes from acceptance to despair to revolt as the play progresses.

David Fuller was Willum the afflicted architect, and sustained his aura of bewilderment with the slings and arrows of outrageous friendship well, making a good foil to Axel the acerbic drama critic, played by Brett Whyte in his usual urbane style. Tracey Brabet's Tansy was probably the best 'acted' of the parts, though the character itself was pretty weak.

Rick the Nerd gave John Goudge a chance to be frenetic, idiotic and obnoxious, and he succeeded admirably. The supporting players provided an effective backdrop of bewildered bystanders.

My only adverse criticism of the perfomance would be that not enough use was made of that precious commodity, silence — for emphasis, emotional impact and to allow a punch line to be appreciated.

We are lucky to have the Drama Club in our neighbourhood, and I for one look forward to the next production.

RESIDENTS AND SUPPORTERS OF WAIATARUA

In May 1989 Broadtech Communications Ltd applied to the Waitemata City Council to erect a 77 metre transmission tower at 41 Quinns Road for TV3. Over 800 residents and supporters objected to this development, so Broadtech withdrew their application. NOW Broadtech have applied for the same designed tower to be erected with transmission facilities at 39 Quinns Road. From their application the proposal is for speculation, as no definite clients are named. Potential radiation risks and visual pollution of masts erected on the Waitakere skyline should be the concern of all residents. With the Government decision to deregulate the communication industry, we could see more masts than trees if we allow this to happen. At present, three transmitters are operating in the Quinns Road/Scenic Drive locations without the Council's approval. One FM transmitter operating for 6 months in Opanuku Road without Council approval, has recently closed down. We must therefore oppose and object to the development of the communication industry in the Waitakere Ranges.

It is important that the Waiatarua community is united on this issue to add strength and credence to stances taken by the community as viewed by those outside the area especially Government and Local Body Administrators.

Enclosed are two copies of Notice of Objection. One is required for the Waitakere City Council, the other for the Applicant, Broadtech Communications Ltd.

Please fill in BOTH copies as follows:-

Item (4) Tick in the box if you wish to appear at the Hearing.

BOTH completed copies can be delivered to the Oratia Store, the Waiatarua Library, or the Brown Post Box outside the Community Hall, West Coast Road.

It is important that all copies be returned no later than Sunday, 26th August, 1990.

If you wish, you can forward them direct to the Council and Broadtech respectively by 4.00 pm Monday, 27th August, 1990.
