
GARBAGE DISPOSAL

(No, not replacing the government!)

One of the options being explored for future garbage disposal in Waitakere City is the establishment of a balefill site in Anzac Valley, which is at the back of Waitakere township. The map shows the proposed site.

- It conflicts with the council's own objectives of protecting the ranges.
- This is a proposal for a 30-year site use, and would provide no incentive to the council to explore more imaginative ways of garbage disposal.

This is leaving aside issues like leachate ending up in the Kumeu stream, effects on property values, traffic hazards in the area, etc.



Your committee will be making an objection, and you may wish to do the same. The closing date for objections is **29 July**, which does not leave you much time. If you want more information, you can contact:

Your committee, while recognising that garbage has to go *somewhere*, believes that this proposal should be resisted for several reasons:

- It is wrong in principle to allow the Waitakere Ranges to be used for what amounts to industrial purposes - this would be the thin end of the wedge.

HALL MAINTENANCE

You may have heard, or read in the Western Leader that asbestos has been found in the ceiling of the library. The discovery was made when investigations were being made to decide what had to be done to bring the hall up to fire safety standards.

The hall was built in 1974, and would appear to have never been satisfactory from a fire safety point of view. The issue came to a head this year with the Fire Service threatening to shut the place down if remedial work was not carried out. Council funds were eventually allocated to this task, largely thanks to the efforts of Cr. Ian Wells, and work is due to start this month.

Back to the asbestos. It is unlikely that there has ever been an ongoing health hazard, as problems usually only arise when the material is disturbed, but having been discovered, it has to be removed.

The work to be done includes enclosure of the underneath of the hall, replacement of the library

ceiling, installation of an alarm system, and associated painting. The work is expected to take a month, and is due to start on July 15th. This means that the library will be closed during that time, and possibly the hall itself as well. However at the end of it, we should have a much safer place to enjoy ourselves in.

All we have to do then is lobby the Council to do all the other maintenance and redecorating that we have been waiting for!

POOCH PROBLEMS PROVE PERFUNCTORY

Either the problems have been greatly exaggerated, as was suggested in one letter, or all those reports we had over the last year were from people who aren't prepared to be specific when the chips are down. Either way, your committee will not be pursuing the matter any further. Thanks to those of you who did write in, but all we can suggest is that if you have problems with dogs in your area, you contact the ranger at Waitakere City Council, phone 837 3700. To help you all control your dogs, we have reprinted an item from a couple of years ago on how to make a running line.

HOW TO MAKE A RUNNING LINE FOR YOUR DOG

You will need:

Two strong posts.

A length of wire (No. 8 fencing wire is very good, but anything that will not break under the strain will do).

Two small rope clamps (from the hardware store).

Swivel clips for both the line and the dog's collar.

A dog chain or lead to attach the dog to the line.

Fix the posts firmly in the ground. Attach the wire to each post. You can just wind the wire around the posts, or attach it to eyebolts screwed into the posts. It doesn't need to be absolutely taut. Attach the rope clamps to the wire at each end, far enough from the posts that the dog will not be able to tangle itself around them.

POINTS TO WATCH

Make sure the clamps are far enough away from the posts - otherwise the dog could tangle itself up and become distressed.

Similarly make sure the chain or lead has swivels at each end - also to minimise the chance of tangles.

Make sure there is a bowl of water within reach - it should be of a type that cannot be knocked over.

Make sure the dog cannot jump over anything, such as a flat roof kennel or a fence, as it might hang itself.

The running line should be set up close to the dog's kennel or some other shelter.

The situation is not hopeless. With a government subsidy we have already sent \$500,000.
