COUNCIL NEWSLETTER

Eco-City and Agenda 21

Council has recently announced that Waitakere City is to become New Zealand's first eco-city. We are adopting the principals of Agenda 21 from the summit environmental conference in Rio de Janeiro last year.

What is an eco-city?

The Mayor's vision statement to Council in January this year contained the following statement:

"My final vision of no less importance, is of a city which cares of its environment - Waitakere as the first eco-city of New Zealand.

To many of us, the environment means native trees, green grass and clean air. But it is more than that. As human beings we need to live in an environment which provides physical nourishment, intellectual stimulus, active and passive recreation, cultural richness, good health, security and shelter. We are finally realising that we must also be in harmony with the world around us if we are to be able to sustain all these positive qualities of the human environment into the forseeable future."

The following are excerpts from reports written for the City Development Committee by Ann Magee, General Manager of Strategy and Development.

"The eco-city concept reflects a holistic view of people within their environments, aware and responsive to the limits and potential of their natural eco-systems.

Being an eco-city is at the one and same time a goal - a place where activities damaging to people and the environment which are avoidable do not occur - and a way of selecting what activities are to be encouraged. Development choices for human activity in the home, work place or recreationally, are made within a framework of sustainability - environmentally, socially, financially . . .

Describing Waitakere City as an eco-city establishes a clear goal of how the City could and should be, and succinctly states the guiding principles for the City's future. This would reflect the city's identity, and convey to business and to the community what the city stands for. Investors, potential residents and visitors would know where the City is going and what values are paramount . . .

There are a range of agencies which can assist Council to identify the most effective ways of proceeding. The Ministry for the Environment, Greenpeace movement, the NZ Institute of Architects amongst others have indicated a willingness to assist Council to identify initiatives that work and could be applied within the city . . .

What is Agenda 21?

"On 12 February, Council was briefed by a representative of the Ministry for the Environment, Mr Nizar Mohamed, on the final document of the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development, held at Rio de Janeiro in Brazil in June 1992. This document is widely referred to as Agenda 21 - perhaps symbolically reflecting the maturity and responsibility associated with being 21 in western cultures. The message put forward is simple. To avoid irrevocable environmental damage and the threat to human survival a concentrated action programme at the international, national, local - and even individual - level is required. In essence, Agenda 21 is a programme to draw together and co-ordinate actions which affect the economy, society and the environment to achieve sustainable development. As such it complements the concept of an eco-city, the principles for selecting the actions and programmes to achieve that goal. Current approaches are seen, despite positive actions

in some realms (endangered species, global action on the ozone layer, the Resource Management Act) to be fragmentary and often in conflict. Failure - environmental, social or economic breakdown - could be a consequence. The Garden of Eden to be passed onto the next generation then would be "full of weeds". Most commentators see this as describing global environmental experience in the last 200 years in particular, and judge decisive action to be an imperative."

To put the eco-city and Agenda 21 principles into effect, we are beginning a review of Council's Mission Statement and Goals, Strategic and Annual Plans and work programmes.

We have applied to become the New Zealand representative in the United Nations worldwide network of cities who have agreed to implement Agenda 21. The programme will be monitored over many years, with information and ideas being shared.

We will continue to update you on these exciting and sensible concepts as we move into making them a reality.
