BOB LANGLEY, LONG TIME RESIDENT

We were looking forward to having Bob Langley come to our history afternoon but he died at 82, a few days before the event was held.

Bob came to Waiatarua and took over the store from Mick Chester in 1964 and was a most obliging storekeeper and friend for 16 years in that position. There are stories of him delivering the groceries and putting them away in the cupboard.

After he retired from the store Bob lived in Cascade Avenue and was hall caretaker for some years.

In 1992 he married Mosina and went to live in Glen Close, Glen Eden. Bob made a significant contribution to Waiatarua and will be warmly remembered.

AN AFTERNOON FROM HISTORY

On Sunday, August 3, eighty people, including Mayor Bob Harvey gathered together to share their memories and unforgettable stories from Waiatarua's unforgettable past.

There was wonderful sharing of these stories and others for nearly four hours. Can you believe that that rascal Bob Harvey and friend Kelvin Lane climbed the TV mast in its early years? (outside transmission times).

You may have missed the afternoon, but you do not need to miss the event. It has all been taped and placed unedited on a VCR tape, available from the library.

The afternoon also saw the relaunching of the book "Song of Two Waters" by Jeanne Wade, with Jeanne being presented with a literary award by Mayor Harvey. If you want a written history of Waiatarua, this is it and it is available from the library for \$18.

A social tea with cakes, biscuits and sandwiches gave an opportunity for people to socialise.

Thanks to David Harré and others there was a historical of old photos, an early bushman's tent equipped with stretcher bed, pots and pans and even a sitz bath.

COMMUNITY BOARD MEETING

Your vice-president braved the lion's den recently and fronted up to the Community Board to present some of the WRRA concerns for our area. He emerged unscathed, but nearly asleep from boredom. Here is what was discussed:

Footpath up West Coast Road from Raroa Terrace

Your committee has presented a case for this to the last two annual plans, and has been knocked back each time, on grounds of cost. We have been concerned that what has been presented by us as a fairly modest proposal has in each case been blown up by the engineers to a major road engineering project, at an inflated price. In addition there has never been any feedback from the Council during the evaluation process, only a decision at the end, when it is effectively too late to do anything about it.

A suggestion was made to move the bus stop down West Coast Road to be opposite Raroa Terrace. This would certainly be a low-cost response, but it was pointed out that while this would improve the safety for children coming from Raroa Terrace, it would in fact significantly worsen the safety of those coming from Bush Road. In addition the sight-lines opposite Raroa Terrace would make the siting of a bus stop there a general traffic hazard.

Community Board members have visited the site and now appear to have a better appreciation of the problem. While they did not give any firm promises, citing general budget restrictions, they undertook to provide better feedback during the evaluation process, and also invited us to comment on the general budget allocation for footpaths for the whole city.

Scenic Drive/Piha Road Junction

We expressed concern that a clearly identified traffic hazard has yet again missed out in the Annual Plan. The committee agreed that the hazard exists, and responded favourably to the suggestion that as an interim measure large hazard warning signs could be placed on the approaches to the junction. Council officers will look into it.

Speed limits

We expressed concern that the speed limit of 70 kph along West Coast and Forest Hill Roads effectively carried over into the side

roads (Rimu Road, Cascade Avenue etc.) due to lack of specific signs on those roads. Council officers stated that while that was not in fact the case, they acknowledged that the lack of signage meant that drivers were given no warning to slow down in the side roads. They will look into the possibility of providing speed limit signs on the side roads.

Waiatarua Locality signs

Your committee has for some time been trying to get permission to put "Welcome to Waiatarua" signs on the roads leading to our fair land. This has been stalled by council officers who say they have been unable to identify the boundaries (notwithstanding our clear historical evidence.) We expressed concern about this lack of progress. Council Officers were dubious about the idea of putting signs at the boundaries as being contrary to Council policy, but suggested that general identification signs may be possible (which is what we wanted anyway!) We await progress with bated breath.

Community Hall Access

During the negotiations for the transfer of the lease of the hall to the WRRA, the council undertook to provide wheelchair access to the hall, and a wheelchair-accessible toilet. Nothing has yet happened. The City Infrastructure Manager promised to chase it up.


Inner/Outer Area Differential Study

This was an agenda item rather than an issue raised by the WRRA, but it is of importance to us all. The current plan is to start the community consultation process during August, with the objective of having a draft funding policy by the end of the year. Concerns were expressed by board members about the timetable, and by officers about the limited resources available for the consultation process. It was suggested that in that case the process should be extended to allow the resources to be available as required which was not met with huge enthusiasm by the officers. It was stated that there is no predetermined view - the study could result in recommendations that range from no change to complete abolition of the differential.

(Vice-Presidential comment: while this may be the "official" view, there is certainly a political movement to remove the differential)

This is an issue of huge importance to local residents—in a worst-case outcome your rates could go up by at least a third—so it is in your interests to be fully involved in the consultation process. Watch this space!

MESSAGE FROM SERGEANT MARTIN LANDSEY

Recently I attended an incident in the Waiatarua area where a burglar had parked at an address where both were known by a vigilant neighbour to be at work. Due to the timely and accurate information from the house, our Eagle Helicopter ensured that any attempts to flee were useless. The offender gave himself up to Police after preparing to steal approximately \$5,000 worth of property.

This story had a happy ending, but unfortunately the majority of house burglaries are only detected when property owners arrive home from work to see the mess left by the offender. In the Waitakere Police District there are between 380 and 400 burglaries reported every month.

What can you do about this invasion upon your community by people who do not generally live among you? These invaders are most likely from outside of Waiatarua and target your area because it is seen as offering burglar protection from being detected.

- (1) Firstly become an active participant in your local neighbourhood watch group. This will ensure that everyone in the Waiatarua community is looking out for each other and not just concerned about number one.
- (2) Secondly, take some steps to minimise the risk of being a target. How easy is it for a burglar to get into my home? What invitations do I signal to the burglar? If you would like some information on different crime prevention techniques you can obtain a free book called "Practical Crime Prevention" from the Waitakere Police Station.

I hope that you all support Mrs Mary Kelly and her efforts to get Neighbourhood Watch functioning well in the Waiatarua community.
