Introducing Jenny Cornell

In 1972, while working in London, I met a few Kiwis who had nearly completed their three years in Europe and were shortly to head back to N.Z. I came with them, on holiday, and have stayed ever since! The "holiday" feeling lasted many many years, (although I got a job within a couple of weeks of arriving here), and has never really left me.

After about a year in Auckland, I was lucky to get a job with Thai Airways and Scandinavian Airlines (they had a joint office) and at the time had no idea that I would still be there 20 years later. When the airlines separated and opened their own officers, I became sales manager of Thai Airways. It was a great career, with our Head Office in Bangkok, and involved travel not just to Thailand but also to India, Kathmandu, Hong Kong, Singapore and Australia. I retired (early!) from Thai last year, after nearly 24 years, as I wanted a change of lifestyle.

My husband and I live on a 19-acre block on Forest Hill Road, which we've mostly planted up with experimental hardwood trees. We've got chickens, a peacock and two new peahens, fish and a dog. Apart from the hardwood trees that are on trial, we have a few figs, persimmons, cherimoyas, lycees and other exotics, and although we're still waiting for some of them to fruit, we do grow organic bananas semi-commercially.

Most of my time is spent around our small farm; yoga, and the Waiatarua Ratepayers and Residents Association committee are two newer interests, as is trying to learn Spanish. Other interests are travelling, walking, reading going to the theatre, cooking (sometimes) and wine.

Born, raised and educated in Southern California, Wade moved to New Zealand in 1981 as a Horticultural Consultant. With Jenny, Wade has resided in the Waitakeres since 1983. Currently dividing his time between Forestry and Sculpture, Wade has his studio on their 19-acre section. 

CURTAIN TIME FOR WEEDS

- Waitakere City Council Media Release -

Native plants could soon replace roadside weeds in the Waitakere Ranges.

Trials are underway in two sites, Mountain Road and the Titirangi end of Scenic Drive, to find low-growing, native plants that can 'outcompete' certain weeds.

Environmental weeds are spread through the Waitakere Ranges along the roads, which provide corridors and transport for plant fragments and seeds. Weeds pose a threat to the City's natural environment, an environment the Waitakere City Council Greenprint recognises the need to protect.

Weeds on the chosen sites are to be killed during May, with planting of natives due to begin in July.

Waitakere City Councillor Peter Maddison said planting low

growing natives could end the need for flail mowing on steep roadside banks, a system where vegetation on road berms is cut to provide visibility for drivers.

Flail mowers also keeps roadside fire hazards to a minimum in some areas by keeping grass levels low.

However, in the ranges, flail mowing favours the spread of weeds including the environmentally damaging Mexican daisy (Erigeron karvinskianus) and mistflower (Agerantina riparia).

Initial planting costs would be offset by savings further down the track in the control of noxious plants and the need for flail mowing. If successful, the planting programme will be extended to specific sites throughout the Waitakere Ranges.

The trails, carried out by HortResearch on behalf of the Waitakere City Council, are on line for completion mid-1999.

ORATIA FOLK MUSEUM RESEARCH SOLVES MYSTERY AND HERITAGE GARDENING PROJECT NEEDS HELP ...

The 20 year plus mystery as to who built the old cottage that is now the Oratia Folk Museum in Oratia, has finally been solved. Research undertaken by members of the Oratia Folk Museum has found that the cottage was originally situated on what was then the end of Parker Road, Oratia was built around about 1857 by a Mr Terence Donnelly. This now makes it one of the oldest buildings in Waitakere City.

Terence was an Irishman who joined the army to see the world and arrived in Australia from Dublin on board a convict ship as a guard. He arrived in New Zealand in 1845 as part of the 58th British Regiment and saw action in the Land Wars. The 58th, who were mainly barracked around Auckland, soldiered on in New Zealand until 1857 and it was around this time that Mr Donnelly decided to put down his roots and farm on the banks of the "Orotea Stream".

In 1855 Donnelly bought 91 acres in Parker Road, Oratia and another 81-acre block of land in Waiatarua. He lived and farmed in Oratia right up until his death in 1889 aged 78 and left behind a middle-aged family of two sons and four daughters.

In the late 1880's, the Moorehead Brothers, both staunch bachelors right to the very end, came to live in the cottage, and it subsequently passed to their nieces upon their deaths in the 1930's.

One of the oldest photographs in the world was taken of the 58th Regiment in the 1840's at the Albert Barracks where the University of Auckland is now, and this hangs in the Oratia Folk Museum. Mr Donnelly is somewhere in the photo and interestingly since the photograph was put up on the wall of the cottage, visitors have reported feeling a "gentle spirit's presence" in the cottage.

Extensive plans for the gardens of the museum grounds and new flowering beds are also being laid in keeping with the 1850's period. The fence is being extended and help is needed. WHAT'S ON:

Watercare's Rain Forest Express

Watercare has opened up public access to the historical Nihotupu Bush Tramway for the first time as part of the Company's programme of public education in the management and conservation of Auckland's water resources.

The Rain Forest Express departs from Jacobsens Depot off Scenic Drive Titirangi, about 4km from Titirangi Village. The tramline runs along the southern flanks of the ranges where spectacular views of the Lower Nihotupu water supply lake and the Manukau Harbour can be seen.

The line features 10 tunnels, six bridges and the Quinns Viaduct.

The Rain Forest Express is available 7 days a week and carries about 40 people. The train departs from Jacobsens Depot or the upper Nihotupu Dam by arrangement.
