Introducing ... Jill Abbott

My husband Ron and I first met when I was 5 and he was 12 in a little place called East London in South Africa. Situated on the coast, roughly half way between Cape Town and Durban. We used to say that the weather was like a baby "if it wasn't wet it was windy". Because of the age difference I didn't see much of Ron growing up. After he finished school he did his 9 months compulsory military training and then went on to Rhodes university in Grahamstown. It was while he was here he got his Springbok colours for trampolining and gymnastics and represented South Africa in the World Trampoline Championships in London and came sixth. After graduating with a B.Com degree he went and lived in Durban. Meantime I was plodding along and getting through school, playing tennis and hockey and generally driving my parents mad.

Towards the end of 1972 Ron came back to East London and opened a Trampoline Centre on the beachfront for the summer before going to Australia in the New Year. So old friendships were renewed and we were married six weeks later and sailed the next day to Australia. He tells me it was a toss up between asking me to marry

him or buying a cine camera (it was in the days before Video cameras) I won by a hairbreadth. I must add that on our travels we did pick up a cine camera and I'm still going which is more than we can say for the camera, so I feel he made the right choice. We lived in Adelaide from where we worked and explored Australia for a year or so. It was here that I saw TV for the first time as South Africa only got TV towards the end of the Seventies – then on to the States, Canada and Europe.

We eventually settled in Durban, South Africa where our two sons were born. Ron worked for IBM (International Business Machines) or as we used to say "Institute of broken marriages" or "I've been moved". We moved both in South Africa and overseas. I worked in Public Relations in the fashion industry, which I loved, it was great fun.

We lived in Johannesburg prior to coming to New Zealand thirteen years ago. We spent the first eleven years at Bucklands Beach, Howick, I sold Real Estate, Ron started his Computer software business and the boys went to MacLeans College. We bought an Econovan and a tent and explored New Zealand from the top of the North Island to the bottom of the South Island travelling down the one coast coming back up the other. There are still bits in the middle we have to see.

Ron went back to university to do an MBA, then my eldest son started university. He had no sooner finished than the younger one started. By the time he graduates we will have had someone there for ten years.

We moved to this beautiful neck of the woods at the beginning of last year. We live on an acre of land surrounded by bush, birds, city and harbour views and great neighbours. We now also share our home with my Mum (they say a girl can't get by without her Mum), two Irish Setters and a cat.

My aim this year has been to learn Ballroom Dancing and get involved in this community.
