For those of you who didn't attend the Waiatarua Ratepayers and Residents Association (WRRA) AGM, you missed out on an entertaining evening courtesy of Mayor Bob Harvey.

Unfortunately, Ted Scott (photographer of the book The Untamed Coast) was unable to make it. He had commitments at Skycity and being a full time photographer he needs to make the most of all opportunities.

The evening was light hearted and we got to experience how passionate Bob is about the West Coast. He has been collecting information relating to the West Coast for around 30 years. In his days as an Advertising Executive he would always make time to visit the library when overseas ensuring he had all the necessary information to write a factual account of the various ship wrecks that occurred in and around the West Coast.

The book has become a best seller in New Zealand with over 12,000 copies being sold. That is more than Sean Fitzpatrick's or Matthew Ridge's books. Bob is planning another two books, one with Ted Scott and the other a story based on two people whose boat capsized coming across the Manukau Bar.

Annual Plan Versus Ratepayers

The Annual plan document is out. There are new directions that our council is undertaking that will have an influence on our rates in years to come. Some are good and some are bad. The Ratepayer's Association is going to try to get out to you some of the more important issues. If you want changes you will have to take the following action, write a submission regarding your objections or changes you wish and forward them to council before the deadline. The annual plan from council is being mailed tomorrow, March 18th and your submission must be in to council by about April 15th. Copies of the annual plan will be in libraries and available from city council. Your ratepayers association will be studying the document on Tuesday, March 23rd. We will try to highlight major concerns and get the information out to you in a special mail delivery.

Some examples of the changes are:

The council has removed around \$10 000 000 from the rates to keep our rates at a 1.79% increase. Some of this \$10 000 000 saved will be collected from us in other ways, for example, you will soon have to purchase rubbish bags at about \$1 a bag (special bags) for your weekly rubbish pickup. Fees for dog licenses, building consents and other consents will rise dramatically.

Other items that have been removed that may have serious future effects are the removal of the clearing of the Oratia, Swanson and Opanuku river streams. This could lead to serious flooding that could cost the rate payers considerably more in the future. They are also planning to remove a large part of the budget for improving their ability for keeping the storm water out of the sewers. This also could lead to increased costs for sewage treatment as well as costs for cleaning up sewage spilling into the back yards of some subdivisions.

Council must look very carefully at the long term flow on consequences for some of their planned savings. It is our job as ratepayers to question some of their decisions. More information will be coming out

in the near future. If we don't respond to some of these decisions, our rates may be much higher in the long run negating the short term savings now.

Arataki Environmental and Heritage Centre

Ever noticed that we only ever seem to go to the "Touristy" type places when you have visitors from out of town or overseas? Well don't make the mistake of placing the Arataki Centre into that category. Arataki or, as it is now called by its official name Arataki Environmental and Heritage Centre is an absolute place of wonder. With interactive displays for all ages depicting some of the challenges a growing city like Auckland faces to displays outlining the process involved in piping water from "our" dams to the general population of Auckland.

Wandering through the short nature trail built in and around growing trees and taking in spectacular views of the Lower Nihotupu Dam, you can easily see why Arataki won two Waitakere Eco City Business Awards in 1998, one for Best Attraction and the other a Tourism Award.

A face-lift in late 1998 has seen the Centre become a recreational and education facility catering for a wide variety of tastes and needs. For those wanting to spend a day walking or tramping you can call into the Centre to buy maps and chat to the staff for up-to-date information on the condition of the tracks you are planning to walk. Or you can just take a short trip into the history of Auckland commencing as you step foot in the building. An ingenious way of showing how times have changed is right at your feet. I'll let you figure that one out when you visit.

No doubt the most popular attraction is the Magnifying Table. Here you can slide spiders, crabs, moths, birds feathers or a cross section of various trees under the magnifying lens and the image is enlarged and shown on a television screen. The image on the screen is crystal clear so you can see detail not otherwise easily seen.

Children are well catered for no matter what age. A separate "Kid's Corner" has been set up with jigsaw puzzles and games all designed to educate the child about nature. For children who want a little more, there is a Gecko display that challenges them to find the Geckos amongst the natural flora.

As with any tourist attraction it has various memorabilia and gifts including postcards, carvings and a good selection of books, including Bob Harvey's Untamed Coast. But there is more than meets the eye at the Centre.

The focus of the Centre is on Recreation and Education. Sure all the displays have a message along with being informative and appealing, however, it is behind the scenes that the real work in educating is performed. School children get the chance to experience history in a true Bush Camp where they can build fires and pit-saw logs by hand. Then they get to load the logs onto a reconstructed railway carriage and tow the carriage through the bush.

Prior to experiencing the Bush Camp students undertake school projects to understand that they are owners of Centennial Memorial Park (Waitakere Ranges) just like all Aucklanders'. They also get an ap-

preciation that by lessening the impact we have on the environment today will ensure the park is around for others to enjoy in the years to come.

So next time you are looking for an inexpensive outing head down to Arataki and remember to leave more time than you think you will need.

Mitch's Recommended Bush Walk

(This will be a regular feature by Mitch, who spends many hours running along the wonderful tracks in the ranges along with running City Lights Café and Brasserie. You are welcome to call in to City Lights Café and Brasserie to chat with Mitch about other walks)

For those of you who have wondered about the Ian Wells Track, now is a good time to walk it. The reason for this is that in another month or two you will need to strap planks of 4" x 2" across your shoulders to stop yourself from disappearing in the mud.

However it is a very good track for history, especially if you link it up with "Cutty Grass" track, Longridge Road and "Fence Line" Track through to the Waitakere Dam. It gives you an opportunity to study the construction of the dams. Five Minutes walk from Piha Road just before the start of Ian Wells Track you can have a close look at an unused dam. Climb inside it and appreciate how difficult it must have been to build it when you consider that is was built around the time of the Titanic sinking.

Along the walk you will see mature pine tress that were planted for the speed of growth. These were used to construct the pioneer homes and for fence posts.

The track ends at Waitakere Dam where you can be collected. Total of 4 to 5 hour easy walking at this time of the year. Parts of the walk are hilly and some fitness is required.

Fabulous scenery, history and overall a great walk with plenty of places to stop and rest.

On the Mitch scale of 1 to 10: I give it an 8 in Summer and a 4 in Winter. So get on those tramping boots and get walking before winter arrives.



The Future of the Waitakere Ranges

Are you aware that there is a society for the Protection of the Waitakere Ranges? This group of dedicated people are campaigning for the ongoing protection of the Ranges. There have been recent reports that within the Waitakere City Council there is a faction wanting to 'water down' or even remove rules protecting the ranges and its wonderful landscape.

According to John Edgar of the Waitakere Ranges Protection Society Inc. the ranges are under more threat today than ever before in the Society's 25 year history. He is expecting that council will support developers who want less protection, more subdivision, more forest clearance and a great density of human settlement of the entire area.

This will have an impact on all who reside in the region, therefore it is up to all of us to show our support. There are two ways of supporting the Society. One is by making a donation to the Society at PO Box 15668 New Lynn. The donations will be used in the Environmental Court for all significant appeals relating to the Waitakere Ranges protection. The second way is to attend the Annual General Meeting to be held on Tuesday 30 March at the Arataki Visitors Centre. Start time is 7.30pm in the Conference Room and guest speakers will be Phil Warren (Auckland Regional Council), Hon. Marie Hasler, MP for Titirangi and Associate Minister for the Environment and David Cunnliffe, Labour candidate for Titirangi. All three speakers will outline their policies for the ranges and will answer questions from the floor.

This is your chance to get involved in really helping keep the ranges as they are today.

Your Backyard Counts

Waitakere City Council has realised that looking after bush and streams on your property is not always easy. An attractive plant you planted in the corner of your garden may start smothering the neighbouring bush like a blanket, making it hard for native vegetation to push through.

Or if you have a stream that doesn't have enough plants on its banks to stop erosion, stream life gets sunburnt.

Or maybe you are worried about how to protect the bush on your property for future generations.

Well help is now available. The Waitakere City Council offers assistance for communities and individual land owners who are improving the environment by:

- Taking care of streams or bush on their property.
- Making sure weeds are not using their land as a base to invade native vegetation.

The assistance is in the form of technical advice, weed bins, some weed spray, some plants and help with fencing and voluntary legal protection.
