#### This Month at the WRRA

At this month's meeting Tony Miguel of Ecowater was invited to talk to us about the Septic tank cleaning and Inspection Programme operating in our community.

(Ecowater has recently taken over the responsibility for the programme and are in the process of letting a new contract.)

Tony listened to the suggestions we made as to the improvements we thought could be made to the existing service. Two of which were....

- 1. A checklist supplied to the owner/occupier at the time of the pump out, to indicate the performance of the septic system.
- That pump outs be conducted at varying times of the year, as a system's performance may vary greatly in the differing seasons.

Tony also presented two pamphlets to the committee, "Caring for your Wastewater System and the Environment" and "Where should Waitakere's Water Go?"

The former pamphlet being a simple, yet excellent guide to septic systems, their maintenance and care.

The WRRA suggested that all households in the area should receive these.

Tricia Fitzgerald presented a comprehensive summary of the findings of the WRRA survey. This proved very interesting reading. (see later in the newsletter)

The next WRRA meeting will be held on Monday  $5^{th}$  July at 7.30pm at the Community Centre.

#### P.S. The WRRA are still urgently in need of a secretary.

# Residents and Ratepayer Survey Brings Interesting Results

The survey has been completed, counted and compiled, and makes interesting reading. Some of the results are reported below, and the rest will be reported in next month's newsletter. With 226 replies, the opinions are considered to be representative of the community.

Who is the community?

- Firstly, 81% of residents come from Waiatarua or Oratia. Some owned property in the area, but lived elsewhere.
- Many of us live here short term. The average length of time spent in the area was 10.58 years, although nearly half (44%) had spent less than 5 years in the area.
- The average household has 2.91 people. 50% had only one or two people, but 45% had between 3 and 8 people in the home. 37% had children under 16 in the household.
- Waiatarua is ethnically homogeneous: 91% of residents were European or Pakeha, with 2% Maori, and 2% identifying as other.
- 53% were members of Waiatarua Residents and Ratepayers Association.

#### What did people say?

 Rubbish, roads and emptying of septic tanks are the most important services to Waiataruans.

- 78% said they have no footpaths and were generally concerned about this.
- 56% said they have no mains water supply, but were not overly concerned about water provision.
- 4) Rates levels were not a major issue. They are perceived as being between somewhat unfair and reasonably fair, with an average score of 2.31 (out of 4)
- 5) 52% of residents make use of the ginger bins and 46% do not, but 94% make efforts to get rid of noxious weeds
- 62% did not understand the rules about subdivisions. The 44% who answered the question thought the current subdivision rules were about right (2.95)
- 7) 38% did not know what a conservation covenant was, but those who did understand it thought it was very appropriate to offer rates relief, if covenants were established.

This month we are celebrating the winter solstice with a lunch and workshop at the home of Margaret Marshall, 19 Raroa Terrace, Wednesday 19th June.


Lunch will commence at 12, but if you are not able to join us for lunch you are welcome to arrive at 1pm for the workshop session.

### Mitch's Recommended Bush Walk

(Mitch spends many hours running the tracks in the ranges. He also runs "City Lights" our local Café and Brasserie,)

#### The Waitakere Challenge

More than two decades ago, a group of hardy runners and myself started a race which grew to be known as 'the toughest cross country run in the North Island.'

It started at the Swanson end of Tram Valley Road, crossed the Scenic Drive past the Waitakere Dam, over the Anawhata Road, through a maze of tracks to Piha Road, following the Huia Ridge Track, Twin Peaks to Huia and ended at the Cornwallis Wharf.

No one knew the exact distance, but we estimated it to be around 50 km. It was always held on the last day of the year and after four or five years the race had grown to be too big for this particular route, and so was diverted along the coastline to Anawhata. The race continued for another ten years until it was stopped by the ARC. At the last race I boasted to some friends that I would do the original race on my 50th birthday. (I'm not sure

if this was a moment of madness or too much New Year's cheer.)

However, my 50<sup>th</sup> birthday came around with the speed of light. Last month a good friend reminded me of my commitment so I thought I would strike a blow for us middle aged. I managed to talk one friend into running half.

I took off just as the birds were stretching, and made good progress. The tracks were in reasonable condition all the way through to Anawhata Road, where I picked up my unsuspecting running mate. I was amazed to find that I was only a few minutes slower than 20 odd years ago. It took only twenty minutes to reach Blackrock Dam.

After crossing the stream we headed up to Centennial Track, where things quickly turned to kaka.

The tracks - Margarite Lucy Cramwell and Kauri Grove Track are virtually non-existent and the exits to Piha Road so badly overgrown that we were faced with an extra hour loop to find our way onto Piha Road.

(I suggest if you are planning to walk any of those tracks in this area, take Rambo, a machete and a compass with you.)

Once crossing the road onto Huia Ridge and Twin Peaks, the tracks turn from bad to worse. Many signs have been removed and you have to sharpen your bushcrashing skills even more.

Anyway, to cut an even longer story short, we got out of the bush after two 1 hour diversions and poor old Graham, running his first marathon.

We arrived at Cornwallis Wharf after nearly 8 hours running and just moments of daylight left.

My conclusion: You are never too old if you set your mind to it.

And one more thing, if you are going to do any tramping of more than four hours duration, make sure you have plenty of daylight left, plenty of warm clothing and check with Arataki or the rangers that the tracks are still there

# "Biosecurity Unit on the hunt for Aussie Import"

The Auckland Regional Council's Biosecurity Unit is on the hunt for an Australian import. One of the main functions of the ARC's Biosecurity Unit is to identify and monitor new plant species which are naturalising themselves in the region. The unit monitors the spread of these plants and determines the risk to the native environment. In addition to new plant species, it also monitors those naturalised plants which are starting to colonise new habitats and the impact they are having on the natural ecosystem.

One plant which I have noticed is becoming widespread in the Waitakere Ranges over the past 18 months is Queensland Poplar (Homalanthus populifolius) or the Bleeding Heart Tree. This Australian native is sold as an unusual, fast growing ornamental, popular for its lower heart-shaped leaves turning red before they fall.

The clusters of flattened grape-like fruits are popular with birds, and this is likely to be the way in which it is spread through

native bush. Seedlings can germinate in low light situations and being fast growing, it quickly overshadows native species. It is a member of the 'milk weed' family with milky sap and therefore poison-

I am keen to assess the spread of Queensland Poplar throughout the Waitakere Ranges, so would appreciate if members of the public could contact me if they come across it. I can be contacted on 817 5153 or 025 222 9069 or
