We welcomed Kubi Witten-Hannah, our Community Board Representative, and local resident Brian Morris, to the meeting.

We were saddened to hear of the death of Gordon Sunde, who was one of our three Councillors for our Waitakere Ward.

There was an increase of 5 members to the WRRA this month, bringing the current total membership of the Association to 139.

GENERAL BUSINESS:

- It was noted that a pedestrian safety refuge had been installed by Parrs Park, which should also curb the speed of traffic approaching the roundabout, from Glen Eden.
- The Association has been asked to provide a representative to the Reference Group dealing with the Waitakere Hospital Upgrade. If you have an interest in health care and have some understanding of the needs of our local community, you may like to volunteer to be the representative for the residents of Waiatarua. - We received an update from "The Ark in the Park" restoration project, outlining fundraising opportunities and the progress on the siting of the Ark. As an adjunct to this project the ARC is offering assistance to residents, who together with their neighbours, wish to trap possums and rats, in their area.
- Quotes for the Community Hall renovation were received from two interior designers. Further discussion on this will take place at our next meeting.

The Ark in the Park - Update.

The Ark in the Park is an ecological restoration project within the Waitakere Ranges, so that the existing indigenous biodiversity is preserved, and species once present in this area can be re-introduced.

The analysis of a suitable siting of THE ARK has been completed. The site will be announced upon confirmation with the ARC and lwi.

Unitech have expressed great interest in The Ark in the Park as it will allow students from many faculties to develop projects that will benefit both them and the Ark project e.g. Plant Sciences who can do scientific studies on flora and fauna

Fundraising has been continuing through a grant from Waitakere Community Wellbeing, and weekend guided walks guided by various committee members with the fees going to The Ark in the Park. A tour of Artists at their studio is being held on Labour Day, starting at Lopdell House with an introduction then participants dispersing as they wish to the various artists, stopping at the Oratia Hall for the included lunch. A grant is to be awarded to a local college staff member who will be able to research for a year the state of the invertebrates within the ARK region. These creepy crawlies being a vital part of the food chain and their numbers give a good indication of the health of the forest environment, and the numbers of various predators who prey on them also.

This Month's Book Review

THE TOTORORE VOYAGE by GERRY CLARK

You have to admire the determination of someone who spent seven years building a 10 metre yacht, 'The Totorore', and with various ragtaggle crew members spent almost four years sailing around the Antarctic and sub-Antarctic waters counting birds in wild and remote places where they had rarely, if ever, been counted before.

Gerry Clarke, was awarded the MBE for making this voyage, and since he died in a later exhibition in 1999 this book is his memorial.

Having made such a voyage it's naturally a must to write a book about it, but is the book a good read?

The book cover says "This remarkable adventure story based on transcripts and Totorore's log makes enthralling reading for anyone interested in blue water sailing and the bird life of the Southern oceans." I can't gainsay that verdict as I'm not very interested in either

I have to say that I found this book hard-going. The diary format means that we get to hear very little of the voices of the various other crew members, mostly bird watchers rather than sailors, who in ones accompanied him for period from a few weeks to a few months.

As Scherazade is told by the Master Story teller in Arabian Nights, "You must make the audience want to know what happens next." There is very little suspense in this book, most difficulties are solved within the day, and therefore within a rather short paragraph. Even the potentially exciting loss of the mast is wasted since the chapter heading is "At sea – Broken mast – Back to Falklands – Mast Repaired". There are occasional paragraphs that bring a smile, like the time one of his friends had to be dragged away from a beautiful, glove-wearing, Chilean lady – he was trying to buy some gloves for his wife in response to her question "Would you like to buy gloves from a Chilean lady". What she had actually said was "Would you like to buy love . . ." However, much of the story is repetitive descriptions of arriving in some remote bay, climbing through scrub on some island and counting the number of birds and chicks.

There are some good photo's and some charming pencil sketches of birds and animals. The writing is clear, well polished, and smooth. The overall effect is being driven to the local shopping centre in a BMW, again, and again, and again. The best way to read the book, is I think to read it at the pace it was written, day by day.


