Held on Thursday 22nd February the AGM had 35 in attendance. (An increase of 30% from last year). Members of the Waitakere Community Board were present, along with Councillor Penny Hulse.

*Gerry Davis presented his 7th, and final, Chairman's report. As most will know, Gerry has resigned from his position as President of the WRRRA, as he and his wife, Karen, will shortly be leaving Waiatarua to reside in Whiritoa.

In his report, Gerry focused on urging the new WRRRA committee to find 'what the will of the people is' in regard to our environment and subdivision in Waiatarua. He described his time as President of the WRRRA as being rich and rewarding. Terry Chapman thanked Gerry for his service to the community and the WRRRA, and presented him with a satellite picture of Auckland and the Waitakere area, in a rimu frame (to remind him of his home in Rimu Road)

*The meeting voted to increase membership subscriptions of the WRRRA to \$10 for a family and \$7 for individuals. This takes effect from now.

*The Piha/Scenic Drive intersection rumble strips were mentioned as to how much effect these had been to improve road safety. It was noted that there is a need for vegetation and signs need to be kept clear of

banks to aid vision. The new road markings had improved the traffic flow at the intersection and the rumble strips had created some improvement on slowing the traffic down. (Remember this is a Compulsory STOP.)

*Concern was raised about 'Structure Plans' and 'so-called' consultation meetings.

*Bill Burrell, our guest speaker, spoke on Conservation in the Waitakere Ranges. He spoke about 'Operation Forest Save' and if we were to rest on our laurels it would only take 7 years to get back to where we were, in terms of possum numbers in the Waitakere Ranges. We need to continue our efforts to rid our area of these pests. Possums are a carrier of Bovine T.B. At present there is no TB in Auckland, north of the Bombays.

Bill also spoke about mustelids, (Weasels, stoats and ferrets) as a threat to native bird life in the Waitakeres. The 'War on Weeds' campaign was also highlighted as something for every resident to actively involve themselves in.

One question from a Waiataruan was "Do you think Bellbirds will return to the Waitakere Ranges?" Bill replied, "There is a distant possibility."

Bill gave a very interesting talk, which was so relevant to where we live.

Road Safety, Traffic Speed and Noise

The following letter was sent by the WRRRA to Ross Hill, Roading Engineer of Waitakere City Council on 27th November 2000. We have yet to receive a reply to this letter, or an acknowledgement that it has been received.

Dear Ross,

Re: Road Safety, Traffic Speed and Noise.

At our last two monthly meetings i.e. October and November 2000, the issue of road safety, including speed and noise on Forest Hill Road and West Coast Road, has been discussed at length.

During holiday weekends and summer months, the volume of traffic using Forest Hill Road and West Coast Road increases dramatically. These roads are two of three direct routes to Piha and other West Coast beaches, as well as access to Auckland Centennial Park. The other road being Scenic Drive.

Unfortunately many drivers, excluding residents of the Waitatarua area, are not familiar with the twists, turns and narrowness of these two roads, hence accidents frequently happen. I believe the speed limit for Forest Hill Road and West Coast Road is 70 kmph, however, this limit is often exceeded, especially when drivers encounter a straight stretch, and speeds of 100 kmph occur.

Pedestrians out for a leisurely stroll take their lives in their hands because of the ignorance of many drivers. There are many school children in our area and they are in great danger when waiting for or alighting from school buses.

A number of suggestions, to help alleviate these problems have been put together by our committee and local residents. These include –

- School Bus Route signs.
- More speed limit signs (to reinforce 70kmph restriction)
- Pedestrian signs.
- Children at Play signs.
- The erection of speed cameras at critical spots.
- Speed Camera Area signs.

The list is almost endless.

Other suggestions put forward were –

- White lines painted across straight stretches of road where speeding occurs.
- Continuous double yellow lines the length of Forest Hill Road and West Coast Road
- A Stop sign at the junction of Forest Hill and West Coast Roads, along with a sign indicating 'Dangerous Intersection Ahead', also the placement of judder bars similar to those when approaching the intersection of Piha Road and Scenic Drive.

The traffic noise on these two roads has also increased due to more high specification vehicles being brought in to New Zealand.

We would ask that Council set up decibel counters at strategic points on these two roads to gather information on what decibel levels are being reached. As you will know excessive levels of noise can be a health hazard as well as a nuisance.

We appreciate that the issues and suggestions put forward are covered by a number of bodies, e.g. Waitakere City Council, LTSA and Police.

I have attached copies of previous correspondence on this issue along with letters to our Community News, for your information.

Our committee would like to invite you to our next meeting on 4 December 2000, at the Waitatarua Community Hall, to discuss our concerns. The meeting begins at 7:30pm. I realise this is somewhat short notice but your coming along would be much appreciated.

A Tribute To The Late Tony Holt

The Waitatarua Volunteer Fire Brigade are at it again. Putting on plays, that is.

It all started in 1996 when Fire Fighter Tony Holt wrote their first play entitled "Phone 1125 J" – (A Short and Three Longs), which was intended to be a "one off" production to raise some much needed funds. The play was an immediate hit with the public and went on to play to full houses at the local hall for an extended season.

In the early months of 1997 Tony was back at work penning the sequel which he called "Phone 1125 J" – (Les Pompiers). This second masterpiece was even more of a success at the box office and became the launching pad for their next major project, the making of the television feature movie "Isaiah's Fire" which premiered at the Auckland Town Hall in October 1999.

Tony became ill shortly after the launch of the film and died on the 5th January 2000, alas never to see the documentary of the making of "Isaiah's Fire" which went to Air on TV1 later that year. Tony did however leave some ideas for a third play in the series, leading the way for the remaining members to become script writers.

It has been written and it's coming to a theatre near you. It's called "Phone 1125 J" (Pronounced - Phone Double One Two Five Jay) and subtitled "If That's Not Out I Won't Play"

Neighbourhood Watch

We are the co-ordinators for Cascade Avenue and we have been quite proud of our record for non-burglaries of late. However on Wednesday 21/02/01 one of our neighbours were broken into during the day losing a large amount of goods – the burglars entered through a rear window. Very unfortunate.

We are receiving regular updates of Watch Word from West Auckland Neighbourhood Watch/Support Incorporated and from this I will try to include brief notes of what is happening in our area.

These are as follows:

Forest Hill Road, Henderson: 3.31hrs 26/02/01: Rental property burgled. Landlord discovered historical burglary, tenant is on holiday. Nil seen or heard. Listed with burglary desk.

Forest Hill Road, Henderson: 22/02/01: Back door unlocked and wide open. Toilet window smashed. Back door key gone and wallet stolen plus a radio. Two offenders were seen by witness, only description was one male maori and one female maori.

Cascade Avenue, Waiaatarua: 8.36hrs: 21/02/01: Home burgled. Listed with burglary desk.

Forest Hill Road, Henderson: 19.20hours: 20/02/01: Reports that a 14 year old girl was on Forest Hill Road with her horse when she was approached by a male caucasian, aged approximately late 30's, with a bald patch in his hair. He stopped by the young girl, called out to her and asked her to go into his vehicle. The young lass jumped into the horse paddock and took off. The offender then took off in a vehicle described as light blue and possibly a ute with an open back. Nil rego obtained. Report sent to Police.

Scenic Drive, Waiaatarua: 1953 hours: 6/02/01: Occupant arrived home and thought to have disturbed burglars. Property stacked up at the door. Back of the property leads to bush. Occupant did not see anyone or any vehicle. Nil located by attending Police or dog unit.

SPECIAL NOTE: There have been a lot of reports on the weekend of suspicious vehicles dumped outside peoples properties. Most of these vehicles were literally dumped bombs, only a couple were stolen vehicles. If this happens outside your property you can ring the Waitakere City Council 24 hour hotline on phone: 836-8045 and ask for the Abandoned Car Officer who will check the vehicle there and then, if it's dumped they can have the vehicle removed by council asap."
