Ward Boundaries Stay

The final decision on the Ward Boundaries and the number of councillors for each ward, has been made by the Local Government Commission.

The four wards of Massey, Waitakere, Henderson and New Lynn, and the number of councillors representing each ward will stay the same.

Waitakere ward will not lose one councillor and Henderson will not gain an extra one, bringing them up to 4. The commission 'did not feel it had been presented with sufficient evidence that the current arrangements did not provide for effective representation of either of the areas proposed for change, or the city in general, or that the proposed arrangements would increase that effectiveness.' It was decided that there was "no clear concensus for change".

There were 69 submissions to the council about the ward system, 37 of these opposed any change. A petition with 225 signatures in support for the status quo was also presented to council.

The ward system will be reviewed again in three years' time.

The Waitakere Community Board Meeting 3 April 2001

The meeting opened with Owen Hughes appointed as Chairman and Kubi Witten-Hannah as Vice-Chairman.

The Board then proceeded with the presentation of proposals for Auckland University of Technology establishing a campus for up to 2500 full time students at the Corbans Estate Winery premises at Henderson.

The speakers' promotion of AUT was outstanding and extremely well received by the Board. AUT is one of 8 Universities in New Zealand and has strong international links. Growth over the last five years has been 30% in full time students.

The essence of AUT is employability for the students. A partnership is established between AUT and the community so that the tertiary education centres around the express needs of that community, in this case Waitakere City.

By way of example, courses could be offered in Winemaking, Boatbuilding, Healthcare and Forest Preservation. Each campus is more or less unique for the particular area. AUT deserves our full support and encouragement.

Only one group from Western Heights Ratepayers Assn. spoke at Open Forum. It was short and very much to the point. At their AGM the members had expressed their great concern at a budgeted zero rate increase for Waitakere City when it seemed this is to be achieved at the expense of cutting back vital resources such as libraries and the care of the environment by reducing litter control and looking after parks. If this is to happen it is your President's view it is not so much the zero rate policy which is at fault, but whether it involves reduction in important Council services. If it can't otherwise be achieved without doing this then we should be prepared to accept modest rates increases for the good of the community.

Our infrastructure must not fall behind or we will suffer in later years when large increases may be forced upon us to catch up, as the two speakers explained.

Finally before passing on to more routine matters, the Board passed a resolution calling for expressions of interest for the vacancy on the Board. Anyone out there?

Fire Brigade News

Care in the Kitchen

- Quarter of all household fires start in the kitchen

- Of these kitchen fires, half start while the evening meal is being prepared and nearly two-thirds occur while frying using fats or oils.

By taking a few simple precautions you can substantially reduce the risk of fire in your kitchen. Avoid the temptation to go off and watch TV or chat on the phone when you are frying with fats or oils. These products are safe when used properly but can quickly lead to a rapidly developing fire if left unattended. Other simple precautions include removing grease build up from your oven, checking the condition of electrical cords, and ensuring that stove elements and ovens are off before you sit down to you meal.

Fri 9th March, 8:52 pm – Car accident, Scenic Drive. A wet, slippery road and mismatched front tyres combined to put a Honda City on its side while cornering. The driver escaped unhurt.

Sun 1st April, 3:49 am – Car fire, Scenic Drive. Yet another torched Honda Prelude.

Sun 1st April, 4:52 pm – Car accident, Forest Hill Road. Head-on collision near Kelly Road after the downhill driver lost control in the wet. Although the crew on Avondale's Rescue Tender had to cut him out of his car, his injuries weren't thought to be too serious. The three occupants from the other car had only minor injuries.

Weed of the Month -

Plectranthus

It's difficult to miss the masses of white to pale lilac flowers along the roadsides at the moment — in patches on West Coast Road, and widespread on Scenic Drive. They belong to Plectranthus ciliatus, an escapee from the garden. When not flowering, it's still easily recognised by the purple veins on top of the leaves, purple undersides and succulent purple stems.

Left to its own devices, this weed will spread into the bush from the open edge and completely smother the forest floor to knee height or deeper. This will completely prevent the growth and regeneration of all native species. Propagation and sale of Plectranthus is prohibited.

Both physical control (by slashing, mowing or rake) and chemical control are effective. After cut material has dried out it can be composted or buried deeply. The recommended herbicide is Roundup at 100ml in 10 litres of water. The most efficient (and cheapest) method is to remove what you can, then spray the remainder along with

any regrowth.

Tip of the Month

For all weeds – if you can't get rid of them this season, at least try to remove the flowers and seed heads. The task then won't be any bigger next year, for you or your neighbours.



It is believed the corrugated iron garage was built in the 1930's, and then sometime in the 50's, the property was purchased by the Whittle family, from a Mr Blake. Lyndsay Whittle can recall many happy hours spent in the garage tinkering with his Morris 10.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Josephine

Re: SWANSON STUCTURE PLAN
Response to articles in your Feb/March newsletter by Gerry Davis
and Wade Cornell.

In reply to the articles concerning Structure Plans in your recent wasletter I wish to make the following points.

I was extremely disappointed that neither writer had approached any of our Executive Committee members, Structure Plan Liaison Group members or myself for opinions or comments before bursting into print with some rather rash statements and conclusions about the Structure Plan process in our area of Swanson.

In order to present a more balanced view to the very strong "anti-Structure Plan" sentiments expressed in these articles I wish to strongly emphasize the following:

The Structure Plan process is a Council provision within the District Plan that provides an environmental tool for considered, sensitive and ecologically sound sub-division with very strict criteria and constraints. It fully supports the Resource Management Act. The process is lengthy, involving extensive consultation with all landowners. It is totally public, transparent and, by its very nature, utterly democratic. If your assumption that the majority of residents strongly oppose this process (because you think it automatically implies "sub-division") then surely this majority will oppose sub-division on their own land, in which case you have no need to worry about unwanted sub-division.

- (b) I object to the suggestion that "some vocal minorities" with "vested interests" have somehow tricked Council into getting their own way. This just isn't true. The Annual Plan submission process is a totally democratic process open to everyone regardless of their point of view. Swanson has had dozens of landowners make repeated submissions for a Structure Plan process, and only after four years of perseverance has the process just begun in Swanson. Lets be real about this. How often do things get done by holding an election on every issue to find out what the silent majority really wants? Even if you did they are unlikely to fill out the forms or turn up at meetings. We can only get balanced consultation and true representation when people get off their backsides, take an interest and become involved in the process.
- (c) I strongly believe that the Structure Plan process (not sub-division) is an excellent way to protect the foothills while enhancing and significantly improving our environment. Obviously Wade Cornell would not agree. As it would take too long to present my arguments here, I would welcome the opportunity to debate the issue at one of your meetings, giving practical examples and illustrations to support my case.
- d) I have deliberately only commented on the Swanson situation because I am intimately involved with it. I have made no rash statements about what the majority really thinks because until the process is complete we will not know. I will say, however, that while we do have widely varying opinions I have been impressed and reassured by the level of communication, willingness to listen, and gracious tolerance of opposing views demonstrated at the Swanson Structure Plan meetings held to date.

While the views expressed above are largely my own personal feelings on this issue, the Swanson Residents and Ratepayers Association Executive Committee has read this letter and formally endorses it. We, as an Association, look forward to more healthy, open debate on this and any other issues that affect our Associations in common.

I trust that you will print this letter in its entirety in your newsletter.
