This Month at WRRA

- The Strategic Plan: Eco +10. Waitakere City has celebrated it's 10th anniversary of being an Eco City.
 A review process has taken place as to what has been achieved throughout this period and 'Eco +10' is a document outlining objectives for the future of our Eco City. This is to be published and open for comment soon.
- The Waiatarua Community Hall has had it's interior overhauled in terms of interior painting and new curtains. The next stage will most probably involve the purchase of new furniture to replace the ageing chairs and tables
- A security upgrade of the Waiatarua Hall is also in progress.

Creative Meeting at WCC to discuss the future of the Waitakere Ranges

The meeting was held on the 20th September with both the Parliamentary Commissioner for the Environment and our Mayor, Bob Harvey, present.

This was called a 'creative discussion' to put forward ideas from a wide variety of groups and individuals regarding the long term strategy for the Waitakere Ranges.

It was a wide ranging discussions with suggestions such as following overseas models for similar wilderness areas in such diverse places as England, Toronto and South Africa. Some speakers saw subdivision under the Resource Management Act as being a threat to the Ranges, although others suggested solutions by the use of QEII Trust for individual owners. The concept of Heritage Parks was discussed. All generally agreed that with the huge growth in Waitakere population the future of the Waitakere Ranges needs to be considered now, as does any protection of the foothills.

Trees were also considered by some to be the saviours for clean air in the environment, providing oxygen and limiting pollution. Other environmental issues included the protection of the hills from erosion

No decisions were to be made at this meeting as it was really a presentation of ideas from the different interests. It gave an opportunity for everyone to have their say while at the same time not becoming a form of debate over any particular viewpoint.

Common Sense Applies

If you're planning to light your own fireworks instead of going to a public display, a few common sense rules apply:

- Fireworks are dangerous. Don't give them to small children to light
- Use a torch to read instructions on fireworks, and follow them.
- Don't try to relight duds.
- Keep fireworks away from open flames, in a closed box
- Pets should be kept indoors.
- If all the above fail keep a bucket of water or garden hose handy, and remember that burns need water for 10 minutes.

Letterboxes . . .

Waiatarua is not the only area experiencing letterbox vandalism. There have been reports of similar incidents in Huapai and Waimauku areas.

Road Closure . . .

West Coast Road was closed by police, between Rimu Road and Raroa Terrace, on the morning of Wednesday 2nd October. Police raided an address in the area. This was apparently drugs related and arrests were made.

As residents we are urged to be more vigilant in noticing, and noting, suspicious activity in our own Waiatarua community and reporting such to the police.

Waiatarua does not wish to become a haven for illegal activities.

The Humble Septic Tank

What happens when the bath is emptied or the toilet is flushed?

How it Works

Liquid household wastes from the kitchen, bathroom, laundry and toilet pass into the septic tank. The solids settle out to the bottom of the tank; lighter solids, fat and grease rise to the surface and form a layer of scum. Sludge and scum are partially digested by anaerobic bacteria. The remaining liquid passes out and is absorbed by the soil. The effluent from the septic tank contains harmful bacteria and has an offensive odour, therefore it is important your septic tank is kept in good condition to avoid polluting your (or your neighbours') environment.

While some older systems are simple septic tanks discharging primary treated effluent to the soak fields, many newer properties will have more sophisticated systems that discharge secondary treated effluent of a less offensive nature to the soakage fields. These systems should have a maintenance contract with the suppliers and require more care with harsh household products that can harm the useful bacteria population that clean up the wastewater.

Maintenance

Depending an the size of the tank and the size of the household, tanks SHOULD BE CLEANED OUT EVERY 3 YEARS. Failure to clean the tank results in the solid wastes building up to the point that they overflow and clog the disposal system. The effluent odour becomes more offensive and the discharge more polluting.

Do's and Don'ts

- Moderate use of household cleansers has little effect an the septic tank.
 Some antiseptics can kill the bacteria which digest the tank's contents. Be careful you don't kill these friends. Harmful household products are caustic or chlorine based.
- Newspapers or disposable nappies won't decompose and may lead to clogging.
- Grease and food scraps should be removed from dishes before washing.
- Roof water and other large volumes of water (such as spas etc.) SHOULD NOT BE PIPED INTO THE SEPTIC TANK as it is likely to lead to an overflow of solids and consequent pollution of local waterways. Remember that we live on low-absorption clays. Waste disposal units cause a faster build-up of solids in the tank so more frequent cleaning is required.
- Try to spread washing loads out. Three loads of washing on Saturday morning can mean 500 litres hitting the system in 2 hours.

If you rely on a septic tank, keep a plan of the system. and record cleaning and maintenance. IF any changes are made to the system. contact the W.C.C. Drainage Inspector.
