Arsonist Welcomes New Residents

Good luck was probably the only factor saving a local couple's Waiatarua home from completely burning to the ground. The pair had just bought a property in the area around Easter time when arsonists attacked. The victims told how they moved partially into their new house before the holiday break and then went away for the long weekend. On their return it was obvious someone had attempted to burn the house down. "It was a bit of a shock, considering we hadn't really moved in!" says the lady of the house.

The fire was started by a piece of carpet rolled into several layers and then saturated with kerosene. Thanks to a hardiplank-type cladding the flames did not burn right through the wall. However an aluminium door and a few windows were ruined, some timber needed replacing and the interior required repainting where smoke damage had taken its toll.

Surprisingly, none of the neighbours were aware of the incident so the fire brigade was not alerted at the time. Police were quickly notified and arrived within 30 minutes, but so far the culprits have not been caught. "It was a terrible experience to come home to" reflect the owners.

Home Invasion

Thieves recently burgled a house in the vacinity of Bendalls Lane, causing unnecessary trauma for the owners on their return home. Entry was gained by smashing two windows. The villains must have been hungry, as food made up the bulk of their haul. Muddy footprints throughout the house indicated that perhaps the route taken was through the bush. Police are currently investigating the incident. If anyone has information pertaining to this please contact Henderson police station on Ph: 839 0600. Extra security is now in place and neighbours are supporting the victims by maintaining vigilance. **Local residents uphold zero tolerance for crime in the sanctuary of Waiatarua.**

- Climbers clematis, vitis cognetaie (ornamental grape), wisteria, ivy (hedera), roses, humulus (hop).
- Perennials peonies, geraniums, delphinium, malva (mallow), primula, violas, polyanthus.
- **Bulbs** narcissi, trilliums, tulips, iris, alliums, crocus, cyclamen. Happy planting!

Fire Brigade

We're currently in discussion with St John Ambulance about the Brigade taking on a formal, medical response role. A number of fire brigades outside the metropolitan area, or some distance from the nearest ambulance station, already do this. At the start of July we completed our annual assessment in the use of our defibrillator and oxygen, and we're investigating additional training.

Hot Tips

Please be aware that ashes can AND DO stay hot for up to five days! When you clean out the fireplace or log burner, ashes should be stored away from the house in a metal container. And remember the 'heater metre' rule – keep furniture, clothes and curtains at least one metre away from heaters and fire-places.

From your library.



Letter to the Editor

I am writing to your community about the roads in the area. I believe they are in shocking condition, and as dangerous as a drunk driver! I took my kids up to some look-outs, driving through 'Waiatarua' using West Coast Road. Between Kauri Loop Road and Bendalls Lane the corners are very hazardous to drive around. Even at a slow speed of 35 km our car slid. My husband says the problem here is caused by permanent 'tracks' made by heavy trucks, which makes the road very bumpy. There is no warning. How about if we'd been going the recommended speed? Gosh, I'd hate to think! "C'mon guys... it's our lives". Being winter now, maybe you need to make your community safer. It's one of the worst I have seen. I'm picking your fire brigade must be very busy.

The Arataki Rangers RoundUp

We have been soldiering along through this cold snap, getting on with jobs around Arataki. The Nursery has had a major cleanup this week, making it look sharp and ready for business coming into the peak nursery work season.

Work is continuing on the Arataki Visitor Centre gardens. The revamp is a huge undertaking and we are inching our way toward completion using ranger staff and volunteer groups. These areas are looking great, refreshing the arrival zone.

The Arataki tracks have been keeping us busy with some high winds, causing 'tree falls' on just about every track in our area! We are getting around and clearing them as best we can. If you are out on a track and see a fallen tree, please help us by reporting it on the rangers station phone.

The animal pest control around Arataki has had an impact. Monitoring has been done to assess how well the possum numbers have been knocked back. The results show that there was a 0.8% trap catch rate in the area, which is very low. The other indication of low possum numbers is the increased presence of birds in the area. Rangers report frequent sightings of tomtits, which have been uncommon in the area during the past.

We are constantly striving to make the Waitakeres a special place for present and future generations. Come and help us by volunteering on any of the various projects going on in the park, from weed and animal pest control to gardening and track work. Walk of the Month

This month's walk is on the Whatipu Coast. The Whatipu area is located at the far south-western corner of the Waitakeres. It is a wild, rugged landscape comprised

of an expansive dune and wetland system beside the Manukau harbour entrance. This spot can be reached by following Huia Road onto Whatipu Road, then driving to the end. Take a map (available from Arataki Visitors Centre) and allow two hours or so to stroll through the dunes and take in this amazing zone for yourself. There are no dogs allowed here as the area is a Scenic Reserve and has ground-nesting birds such as the New Zealand Dotterel.



'Common Weed' Sense



Self-Heal has a long tradition as a wound-healing herb. The fresh leaf may be used or a poultice / compress made to aid in the clean healing of cuts and wounds. For sore throats it may be infused and used as a gargle, sweetened with honey. Infusion: - pour a cup of boiling water onto 1 to 2 teaspoonfuls of the dried herb and leave for 10 minutes. This can also be taken 3 times a day as a tonic.
