#### **Garden Group**

#### **Fire Brigade**

We're in the process of purchasing a replacement second vehicle and have located a small four-wheeldrive, double-cab truck. We value the Trusts' role in supporting our local Volunteer Fire Brigades, and are grateful to Kevin Healy for his efforts in co-ordinating this.

#### **Civil Defence Exercise**

The exercise involving Fire, Ambulance and Civil Defence was carried out on Sunday 1st August at Huia Dam. The crews were presented with a scenario of two vehicles 90 metres below the road after an accident. Waiatarua Brigade provided one crew who were tasked with triage, with the Brigade and friends also supplying 14 casualties. We're grateful to those who gave up their Sunday morning for this.

#### **Recent Calls**

July

9:16 pm, Fri 23rd – Car crash at the bottom of Darkies Hill, Piha Rd. Two cars collided head-on and left six people injured, two of them seriously. One of the badly hurt was trapped in the vehicle and cut out by crew from Henderson Rescue Tender. Waiatarua crew provided scene management and first aid. At one stage there were four ambulances at the incident. The Police Serious Crash Unit attended and the road was completely closed for more than two hours while they completed their investigation.

12:20 am, Fri 6th – Car fire, Turanga Rd. Again the Police were heavily involved – it was their car! A complicating factor was that they were unable to retrieve two cases containing a small amount of ammunition from the burning vehicle, so we were forced to wait until the fire (and fireworks) died down before extinguishing it. Although we were confident that the scene was then safe for us, we accepted the Police offer of bullet-proof vests for the crew. The media picked up this story.

8:50 pm, Tue 10th – Car versus pole, Piha. Turned back en route

8:23 pm, Wed 11th – Electrical shortcircuit, Forest Hill Rd.

11:15 pm, Thu 12th – Car over bank, Scenic Drive. The driver had left the scene, but Police and their dogs were doing their utmost to track him down.

6:31 pm, Fri 13th – Car spun outside Fire Station, no injuries. 5:39 pm, Sat 14th – Car fire at the far end of Anawhata Rd.

#### Walk of the Month


This month's feature is the Waitakere Dam Walk. It begins at the Waitakere Dam carpark which is located 1.5km north of Mountain Road on Scenic Drive. The walk takes approximately thirty minutes each way and is down a sealed road, so is suitable for prams or buggies.

Walkers will go steadily down the dam road to meet the Waitakere Dam. Halfway down, the road branches off to a seven-metre wide Kauri tree.

There are spectacular views to be had over towards the cascades area from the dam face.

A walk for a further ten minutes along the road past the dam goes to an earth saddle dam.

#### Letters to the Editor

Dear Editor.

The 'Seasonal Garden Advise' section in last month's newsletter highlighted the fact that some residents of the Waitakere Ranges are unaware of the need to preserve the native bush and stop the introduction and continuation of exotic plant pests. Most of the plants on the suggested planting list are exotic; some such as Hydrangea and Ivy are actually on the Weedfree Waitakere and Waitakere City Council lists for invasive weeds. Native plants are forced to compete with introduced exotic plants, especially rampant growers like Wisteria (also on the list) which devastates all in its path by climbing up and smothering the canopy. As a direct result of the decline of the natural habitat native birds either disappear or are forced to feed on exotic species, which in turn spreads the seed of the exotic interlopers. It is frustrating to say the least that while many of us struggle to repair the damage of man's carelessness, others blindly continue to disregard what is a prominent Waitakere issue - the regeneration, stabilization and maintenance of our precious environment

#### **Fire Restrictions**

As we quickly motor through the year just a reminder of the 'Restricted Fire' season which starts December 1st, when any "open air fire" will require a permit from the Council. There is no charge for the issue of fire permits.

If you live in a rural area like Waiatarua, and if you must burn rubbish or garden waste in large quantities, then follow these rules:

- \* Check with Council to be sure you understand <u>all</u> the regulations.
- \* Don't burn plastics, rubber, paint, poisons, painted wood, treated timber, dust, food scraps, wet material, fabrics, green grass, foliage, tins, or glass. These materials may produce large quantities of toxic smoke. \* Don't burn between the hours of sunset and sunrise.
- For incinerators:

\* Your incinerator must be 3 metres from your boundary and 12 metres from any building.

- \* You must ensure that air is circulating through the fire.
- \* Your incinerator must not be close to anything combustible.
- There should be adequate water supplies available to put out the fire.
- \* The incinerator should not be left unsupervised while in use.
- \* You should ensure that the wind isn't blowing towards your neighbours washing or through their windows. And don't forget that fires cause smoke, smells and unhealthy effects, and can get out of control!
