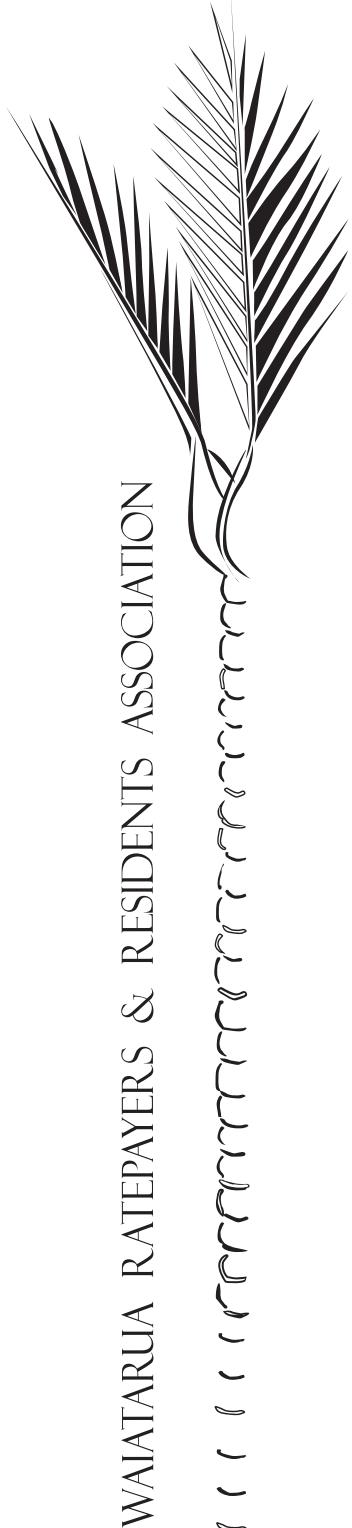

Mayor Bob Tallies Local Signs

Following the release of this recent Mayoral Report from Bob Harvey, our photographer has been out and about taking pictures of signage in our neighbourhood.

Mr. Harvey's count of 126 road signs was allegedly challenged by Diane Goodley, Waitakere Community Board's deputy chairwoman. Mrs. Goodley counted only 79.

We contacted the Mayor for feedback and his comments to us were: "I am all for safety, it's of major importance, but it's got to be matched with the environment. We didn't even count the street signs, just road signs and markings. The whole road is festooned with bits and pieces and I am sure they are not all necessary."

Mayoral Report September 2005

The Road to Waiatarua - A Sign of Our Times

"Although I believe in public safety and signage, lots of it around dangerous corners and nasty bends, it seems to me our roads, particularly through rural areas, don't need to be festooned every 100 metres with warnings and instructions.

I have certainly noticed on the Desert Rd that large, anti-speeding signage tends to slow you down and large and serious warnings on the fatal Meremere stretch have reduced the carnage. But the West Coast Rd, from Parrs Park to Waiatarua, is a different kind of highway. It moves quickly from urban density to orchards, vineyards and the foothills of the Waitakere Ranges. Yes, it does have a few more bends than the Desert Rd but these come much later, near the summit of the ranges. Most of the time the road goes past schools, along the flat down to Kelly's Bridge and then rises to Waiatarua and onto Piha.

Over the past five years I've noticed more and more signs appearing on this stretch of road, a mere 5.1 kilometres, so we are not talking serious distance. So how, I have to ask, have we accumulated 126 road side signs? That's right, I said 126. I've counted them. And that doesn't include street or road signage. That's just signs nailed, screwed or bolted to posts warning



about horses, graders, speed, road contours and bridges. I have included in my Mayoral count broad bands of arrows and bridge markings - after all they are on the road and clearly indicate what you should do and what to watch out for. And there is a lot to watch out for. I have no problems with signage around schools and particularly Oratia, one of my favourite schools, so a warning that a school is nearby is a must. But, as for the rest I believe we have gone truly overboard.

To be honest I don't see any end to it. Every new community board adds more signs. Go count if you need to but would someone please take stock of what is needed, what warnings need to be spelt out and therefore what can go."

Tag Your Intruders

An intruder-deterrent paint has been designed to mark the clothing and hands of trespassers who come into contact with it. Introduction of Bill delayed

The Waitakere Ranges Heritage Area Bill will be delayed in reaching Parliament, because the Councils promoting it have discovered a minor draughting error in one of the boundary maps. It was discovered at the last minute, that a small area of land in Rodney had accidentally been included when it should not have been. This arose because two private coastal properties, adjoining a Department of Conservation reserve, had inadvertently been included in the heritage area. The intention had been to include the reserve but not the private property. The map forms part of the documents publicly notified during the preliminary process required before a local bill can be introduced to Parliament. As a result Rodney District Council, Waitakere City Council and the Auckland Regional Council have chosen to correct the error and publicly notify the bill a second time. It is hoped the Bill can still be introduced this year (2005).

Roadwatch Report

Overnight 11th/12th October a major slip occurred on Scenic Drive, completely blocking the road 200 metres from West Coast Road intersection (vicinity of 440 Scenic Drive). A day later the road was open again as a single lane, but with frequent delays for earthmoving activities. Road barricades have been under this slip area for several months, indicating a concern. At the time of this report the road was fully open again, with a row of plastic barricades in place at the foot of what still appears to be an unstable hillside.

On Tuesday 11th October a couple of guys in a black car were 'practising parking' in the ditch just before 710 West Coast Road. Cell phone reception looked non-existent for organising the tow they obviously needed. Luckily no-one required an ambulance. Once again this risky stretch of road has proven that drivers must always take great care!

Guy Fawkes Bonfire

You're invited to join us at the community bonfire at the Fire Station on Guy Fawkes Day, Friday 5th November, from 7pm. Rain day is Saturday 6th. The fire will be lit later, when it gets dark. You are welcome to bring a guy for the bonfire if you wish, and please BYO fireworks. We will have an area set aside for you to light these.

Whether you bring your fireworks to the station or use them at home, please remember basic safety rules. Store fireworks in a safe place, read the instructions with a torch, and don't give them to small children to light. They should be in an open area away from people and anything flammable, and don't try to re-light duds. And remember that even sparklers can cause serious injury – they burn at 700° C.

You don't need a fire permit for a bonfire as these are not required until December 1st. But it must still be safe, and you should have a hose handy. Please don't hesitate to phone 111 if you're concerned about your own or your neighbour's bonfire. We'll check it out, and it's always free!

4:39 pm, Sat 9 October – Car over bank, Scenic Drive near Arataki. No-one saw the accident, but two local residents walking on the Nature Trail heard it. They did extremely well to locate the vehicle which was not visible from the road, and upside down about 40 metres into the bush. The driver was trapped in the car and cut free by crew from Henderson's rescue tender. She had only relatively minor injuries.

Letters to the Editor

Dear Editor,

After the letter last issue re noise it got me thinking about what the rules in our area are, so I did a little research. With the festive season coming up I thought it would help to have some ways of remaining on friendly terms with neighbours. The information comes from the council and can also be easily accessed on their web site. The Council describe noise as; stopping someone from sleeping or waking them, if during day time it causes a serious intrusion to concentration, if it prevents normal conversation in a neighbouring property or it requires the radio or television to be turned up significantly (by the neighbour) to be heard. The noise officers can be called out at any time day or night, but from Monday to Thursday and on a Sunday between 10pm and 8am or Friday and Saturday 11pm to 8am if a complaint is laid it will be sent straight out for action to the noise officer. If a complaint is laid at other times, the complaint is logged and if another neighbour complains or if you ring back and activate the complaint 30mins later the noise officer will be sent to investigate. The same rules apply city wide. The web site <http://waitakere.govt.nz/cnlser/eh/noise.asp#excessive> gives several suggestions for keeping noise levels down including; keeping equipment inside, keeping radio etc. close when working and relaxing, and warning/respecting neighbours. I suppose the modern ultimate sound solution are the ipod silent concerts.

In our area where we often can't see our nearest neighbour it's important to realise that sound travels. Bass particularly has a way of invading other peoples homes, and whilst the music may not seem loud to you, the bass can cause neighbours distress and can result in receiving a visit from the noise abatement officer. Whilst it may appear that here we are more isolated from our neighbours, noise can travel and introduce us to people on a different ridge or in a valley some distance from our house. Whilst talking to the neighbour may be the ideal, not all neighbours feel safe asking for the noise to be turned down; and the neighbour being affected may not be right next door to you, and therefore unable to pop across.

Example: Waiatarua Community Centre, 911 West Coast Road, Waiatarua (*suburb*), Waitakere City (*city*), Auckland (*region*), New Zealand (*country*).

Can you improve on this? Does anyone in our area know about those 4-digit codes? Is it 1007 for all of Waiatarua?

As an intellectual exercise, if nothing else, some criteria: Is the address complete enough for the purpose? Are there any unnecessary details, or lettering? Is it up-to-date and legally correct? Is it helpful to visiting motorists and emergency services?

I would welcome input from other experienced and qualified people.

Reasons we should consider include:

Waiatarua has officially been defined, at least in Ratepayers and Residents minutes. Does our Council define Waiatarua? The "city", for around ten years now, has been officially recognised as defined and few people need to be told which it is: WAITAKERE - no longer just the village northwest of Swanson.

Mail for here is, I believe, sorted elsewhere. Is it new Lynn? It used to be sorted in Glen Eden's little Post Office, and the address in the 1930's was *West Coast Road, Nihotupu, Glen Eden R.D., Auckland*. And now we have standard urban delivery (don't you think these quiet little motorbikes and their cheerful riders rather charming and efficient?).

Whilst on the subject... I was horrified to see three or four letterboxes damaged, between Kauri Loop Road and Rimu Road early on Saturday the 1st of October - but several bright new ones too!
