* Celebrating the Ten-year Anniversary of Fire Brigade Plays. *



On Anzac day 1996, the Waiatarua Volunteer Fire Brigade unleashed the first of its very successful plays into existence. Written by Fire Fighter Tony Holt, produced & acted by brigade members and their friends & family, "1125-J, A Short and Three Longs" was originally set to be open for three weeks as a fundraiser for the yet-to-be built and desperately needed new fire station. 1125-J was such a hit that the original season

was extended to four, then five, then six weeks. The show was set in the late 50's, early 60's and was based on the starting up of a volunteer fire brigade. When the Glen Eden Fire Brigade took too long to get up to Nihotupu to save Badger Davies' house, the locals decided to start up their own fire brigade.

Isaiah Woodhead (Brigade Superintendent), Ivor Cheslenkoff (Foreman), Badger Davies, Bulldog Clipp and Arty Trembol were the founding members. Isaiah found himself involved with two women - Betty Swollocks and Mary Trembol, Arty and Nelly's daughter. Ivor confused everyone with his command of the language. Badger did things in his own way at his own pace and Arty and Bulldog were your typical kiwi blokes. Together they teamed up to form the Nihotupu Volunteer Fire Brigade.

A year later the second in the series, "1125-J, Les Pompiers", opened and was just as successful and continued on the misadventures of the Nihotupu Volunteer Fire Brigade. 1998 saw a break in the series with "Red Hat No Knickers", about a ventriloguist and his dummy. From there the team went on to to make 'Isaiah's Fire' - the film version produced "on the smell of an oily rag", the efforts of which were the subject of a documentary

produced by Greenstone Productions and which can still be seen from time to time on late night telly on TV1. Two years later a third in the 1125J series was performed, "1125-J, If that's not out, I won't play"

Next year, to celebrate the 10-year anniversary of the original show, the production team and some new 'recruits' from the Waiatarua Performing Arts Society will present "1125J, Greatest Hits" - a compilation of the best scenes from the three



Waitakere Ward Boundaries to Change

You may not have heard about the review of the City's electoral system, unless you visited someone in the urban part of the City in August this year and read the Western Leader from cover to cover and spotted the notice about a public meeting the next day. However that is all history now and on Monday the 28th of November the process starts in earnest with a public meeting chaired by Councillor Clews. The review must be completed before the next Council elections in 2007 and is required by the Electoral Act 2001. It will establish the "Basis for Election" as required under the Act. The next step in Waitakere City Council's review of its electoral system is to decide whether the city will have three or four Wards in future elections. Changes have to be made to the Ward system because under new electoral rules, Waitakere Ward does not have a big enough population to elect three Councillors. The Council's Finance and Operational Performance Committee is proposing to discuss three options with the public, through an informal community information process that will run from now until late February. Then in March 2006 the Council will select one option to go forward for formal public consultation. To establish the Basis for Election, the Council must create Wards that have a "community of interest" based on common characteristics that help define a community. For example, it can be transport services, the stream catchments patterns, landscape features, the way land is used, etc.



Fire Brigade

The weather, and a careful community, ensured that at Waiatarua we attended our usual number of fireworks-related calls: **zero**. Although Kevin Healy did come across a small (but developing) grass and scrub fire on the side of Scenic Drive a few weeks ago. Others had already called the Fire Service but Kevin wasn't going to let the lack of a fire engine hold him back. It WAS the Scenic Drive after all, so he soon found some dumped car parts and promptly beat the fire out with a discarded plastic bumper. 10/10 Kevin!

Summer Safety:

Yes, it's time to check the gas hoses on the barbecue and clean out the drip tray. A layer of kitty litter in the tray will help to soak up the fat. Please keep an eye on the kids while it's lit, and do leave the cooking to someone who's sober! If you have visitors staying overnight, take time to ensure they know how to get out in a hurry if required. And a smoke alarm and escape plan are just as important in the tent or caravan as they are at home. If you're staying at home, you'll need a fire permit for any outside fire – call the Council weekdays between 8:30am and 5pm on 839 0400. You'll need to give them at least three working days notice.

Recent Calls:

7:50 pm, Sun 16 Oct - Car vs. bank, outside the Fire Station. No-one trapped, no-one injured. In fact, no-one even there by the time the Fire Brigade and Police arrived!

5:44 pm, Thu 20 Oct - Smoke inside house, Forest Hill Rd. This was first thought to be smoke from a neighbour's fire forced into the house by atmospheric conditions, but later found to be charring of framing behind a built-in wall oven

2:54 pm, Sun 23 Oct - Car crash, Bethells Rd. Sorted by Bethell's crew.

3:35 pm, Mon 24 Oct - House fire, Shaw Rd. Although smoke alarms are primarily designed to save lives, in this case a \$20 smoke alarm saved a \$200,000 house. Vigilant neighbours checked when they heard the alarm in the unoccupied house and called the Fire Brigade. By the time the first appliance (from Titirangi) arrived, the smoke level in the top floor was down to a metre above the carpet; but the fire was quickly extinguished with relatively little fire damage.

4:17 pm, Sat 29 Oct - False alarm, West Coast Rd.

8:58 pm, Sun 6 Nov - Rubbish fire, West Coast Rd.

3:52 am, Wed 19 Nov - Rubbish fire, Scenic Drive.

A Blast From The Past:

For those who don't read the small print...

sing your credit card at locations where your funds cannot be verified such as at unattended petrol pumps, carparks, hotels and car rental companies could cause you embarrassment. In some situations like this the company takes an imprint of your card, and locks off \$100-00 on top of the cost of goods/services. This hundred dollars can be on hold and out of your reach for up to a week. At the time of 'lock off' the funds belong to the company until they release their hold. Some banks will notify customers when this occurs, but not all. Hotels may hold an amount way in excess of \$100-00 to cover costs at the end of your stay plus what you might spend on a daily basis (meals, mini bar etc.). All this means you may not be aware that your credit is considerably lower than you think, or in debit. The procedure is perfectly lawful. About all you can do is request to have the 'lock off' amount disclosed when an imprint of your card is taken.

A Little Bit of History

This brief summary is meant as friendly to many friends, some slightly further away...

I have lived in this area for a very long time and attended both Nihotupu and Oratia schools, by bus and on foot. Now most folk have cars!

Mail in the 1930s was delivered to Waiatarua for a while by Mr. McFarlane (Mac) in a long red and buff rectangular bus, with several doors along the side. It headed for Piha not only with postal bags but also meat, bread and passengers. Parcels were also sent from that "new" terminal in Commerce Street. Other years, Mr. Badham brought and took our mail in his big car – a Hudson Super Six, or similar – also rectangular, black, with a third row of folding seats (very relevant to the Farley's, later Badham's, guest house at KareKare).

We were glad to get mail three times a week. Red flags on our boxes went up when outward mail was to go... from our own gates: one penny for an ordinary letter. There used to be about one house every 350 metres when I was born. House numbers came around 1960, I believe.

In the late 1940s and 1950s, mail and bread came together; sorted in or via Oratia's little Post Office, corner of Carter Road where Mrs. Erceg (later it was Mrs. Couchman) was postmistress. And the place name "Oratia" remains with many of us although, may I suggest, now an indistinct word. Mind you, NZ Post doesn't seem to care whether we use Oratia or Waiatarua – bless them all.

The pre-1960s name Nihotupu, for the area west of Oratia, was ruled out by the official Geographic Board decision in late 1960 or early 1970. I wonder how many recall that each of us had to pay a hefty \$80-00 annual rural delivery fee for quite a few years until commonsense and much lobbying by our worthy WRRA committee, and others, recognised our "city" mail's character – rather a surprise to old me!

The hospital's transfer system will also benefit, especially as Auckland's traffic problems increase. Flying from Waitakere Hospital to Auckland Hospital will take just six minutes.

Mr Mayor:

In response to your comments on the number of signs on West Coast Road...

First of all, I hope you are not responsible for the wages at Waitakere City Council because those 126 you counted are in fact 86 and that includes bus stop signs.

Now do not get me wrong - those of us who chose to live out in "the bush" in the Waitakeres do not want an invasion of signs and other 'urban signatures'. However, we do want to live in a safe environment and on that particular stretch of road there are some of the most severe bends in this area. All the 'accidents' (we call them crashes) appear to be at these bends, where drivers lose control of their vehicles, normally due to speed.

You rightly mentioned Oratia District School and no one can argue with your comments and the council's attitude to safety but those same children come in to that school via West Coast Road, Scenic Drive, Forest Hill Road and Piha Road. Alot of them catch the bus on route down West Coast Road. There are insufficient properly placed bus stops and there is a distinct lack of 'school bus route' signs.

We must remember that a good deal of WCR is without pathways, there are next-to-no lamp posts and a number of drivers who travel to and from work at the times our children are commuting to school. We must also remember that during the summer, we have thousands of visitors travelling to Piha. Most are locals and a good deal of regular surfers who understand the driving skills required for these dangerous roads. However, there are a number of 'foreign' drivers who need that extra persuasion to drive safely.

I have no complaints of the council and have found positive responses to our (Waiatarua Ratepayers & Residents Association) requests and questions involving road safety issues.

Further to last month's WCN with Bod Harvey's comment about the large number of road signs and John Isaachen on the confusion of our correct postal addresses, we really seem to have truly lost our identities.

Living just above the bushline on WCR we don't know whether we live in Oratia or Waiatarua and there's nothing to tell visitors or even us, as residents (of 17 years), where we live... let alone our addresses!

It has been rumoured that the boundary is at the Kelly Road intersection on WCR, but it's certainly not clear for travellers when entering Oratia or Waiatarua where they are. Perhaps the boundary should be at a more noticeable natural boundary, like the bush-line where the WCR rises into the hills rather than the bridge?

We are still "village communities" in the true sense of the word, but with the two completely different identities of cultivated orchards and native bush. We have not been completely gobbled-up by the mighty Waitakere City, only annexed (together with the name of our hills!).

For many years our postal address was Oratia R.D. until we were put on the city postal system and our local post office was closed down. We seem to have an official address which is half the time in Oratia and half the time in Waiatarua but, having said that, our visitors do seem to master the pronunciation of the name Oratia more easily than Waiatarua - and certainly more easily than Nihotupu.

As a suggestion, and somewhat in defiance to Bob, could the two communities of Oratia and Waiatarua get together and provide an attractive double-sided sign to clear the confusion? And perhaps a small sign to advise of the stream they are driving over at Kelly's Bridge... but then perhaps everyone wants to keep it a secret to confuse the non-locals and to ensure we fully understand we are merely insignificant parts of Waitakere City with no local identity.

Times move on and our area becomes more densely populated as Auckland expands, but we should try to retain some small part of our historical ties to the past and our identities. - Geoff Waller



'communities of interest'. During the last round of Community Board Meetings two Community Boards, Massey and New Lynn, voted in favour of the three ward option (Option 3 above). The Henderson Community Board voted in favour of the Land use Option. (Option 2 above). Several of The WRRA Committee Members attended the Waitakere Community Board meeting on 2nd November. During our last WRRA Meeting the committee fully endorsed the Waitakere Community Board decision. Following are the two motions carried by the Waitakere Community Board

That the Waitakere Community Board strongly endorses the inclusion of an enhanced status quo option which retains the current configuration of the Waitakere Ward but has minor boundary adjustments to ensure compliance with the +/- 10% rule and that this option be included in the options that are taken out for preliminary public consultation prior to Council making its initial decision on the option to take out for formal consultation.

Whittington's Way



Matthew and Molly Whittington purchased their rambling Forest Hill property in 1990, amidst much scepticism over the possibility of restoring the old Chisholm 'Party House' to anything resembling its former glory.

The land had not been farmed for thirty years and kikuyu grass ran rampant. The homestead itself was rather neglected, unlike the days when Joan Chisholm entertained the district upon her white shagpile carpet. Such was her pride and joy over this plush floor covering that a shower was installed at the back door, where menfolk were asked to wash before entering. Joan, a Remuera socialite, was wife to John Chisholm junior who inherited the estate from his father. John senior built the house in the early 1900's on his 380-acre sheep station.

The farm has been subdivided many times over the years, and the house now stands on three acres. A little black building near the front entrance pre-dates the house. It still stands on the original totara piles, and was the shearers' quarters for the early farm hands.

Over the past decade-and-a-half Molly and Matthew have definitely proven the sceptics wrong. From the minute one enters the gate, the richness of this place is breathtaking. Large cobbled areas lead to manicured lawns displaying grand old shady trees. Terraces adorned with Molly's artful mosaics add to the dramatic representation. A unique-but-practical tiled outdoor sink makes for an interesting visual display near the elevated wooden hot-tub, which is only accessible to adults via tall pottery stepping poles.

The home itself has been renovated from top to toe and wrapped around with verandahs so authentic they surely must have always been there. Views sweep through native bush and on to the Harbour, Rangitoto and Coromandel Peninsula. Four lucky children share this paradise with their dedicated parents. Indoors... the solid wooden kitchen, featuring large freestanding chopping block, oozes activity – baking, collage, floristry and bug-collecting. The long adjoining dining room accommodates an absolutely massive kauri table, fifteen feet in length when fully extended.

Native plants and interesting sub-tropicals make for a pleasant walk around the property. Further pathways are under development, one in particular incorporating a large circular feature atop a bridge. The more mature native bush surrounding the Whittington's land belongs to QEII Trust. It boasts a quite tremendous Kauri tree, which dwarfs Molly in comparison and reminds them both of there custodial duty to protect and maintain this very special spot. The Chisholms would be proud.
