

Postcode Perplexity

fter receiving several letters re the newly allocated postcodes and some confusion over Waiatarua's boundaries, we Aregistered our own inquiry on the matter via NZ Post's on-line customer support service. For your information, the response was:

Good afternoon

Thank you for you enquiry regarding the use of Oratia and Waiatarua on the recent Postcode mailer.

The purpose of the mailer was to inform customers of NZ Post of the new postcodes for the address the mailer was delivered

The boundaries we used on your mailers are the suburbs and localities as defined by the Emergency Services Association as Waitakere City Council has yet to define and have gazetted all its suburbs and localities. Once they have done so we will incorporate this information into our systems and update our published material.

The key elements of an address for postal purposes are the street number and name and postcode, followed by the town and then suburb. The first three elements are enough to uniquely identify the destination of the mail and our new machinery can then sort it down to the postie round level. Should one or more elements be missing or incorrect then the machinery look at the rest of the address and deals with the mail by either sending it to the relevant mail centre or delivery branch where it is sorted manually or rejects it a source in which case it is investigated and if necessary returned to the sender.

To have a look at the postcode boundaries there are maps on the NZ Post web-site at -

The locality or suburb line is not as important as the street delivery line and postcode so if a customer is comfortable with a particular label for their address as long as the other elements are correct will be able to sort and deliver the mail (and even if they aren't we will still try to determine the intended address and deliver it but it will take a bit longer). Additionally NZ Post has a vast database of adjacencies and alias for suburbs and localities, including abbreviations and spelling mistakes, to assist with sorting mail.

Suburb and locality boundaries do not normally go down the centre line of roads but are defined by land parcels and are normally the back of land parcels where they follow roads. As always there are exceptions to this rule and parts of the boundary between Oratia and Waiatarua are one of them.

Looking at a map of LINZ land parcels the boundary is between numbers 867 and 869 on the North of West Coast road opposite Bush Road and between Rimu Road and Roaroa Terrace on the Southern side. The black line on the following shows this boundary.

Property Rates on Council's Website

Homeowners are able to visit the Waitakere City Council's website on www.waitakere.govt.nz and see what rates they will be paying for the coming year. The council is promoting this service to assist ratepayers to find out as quickly as possible what their rates will be this year, rather than wait for the first rates notice in August.

The council wrote to ratepayers in April, telling them what their rates would be if the capital value system was adopted, instead of the traditional land value system. However, after submissions from the community, the council has retained the land value system for the next year but has changed its method of charging for waste-water.

There will now be a fixed annual charge for waste-water of \$350, plus a small variable component based on a property's land value. Where a property provides more than one dwelling - for example if a house is divided into two flats, or if there are two houses on the one property – \$350 will be charged on each one.

"We decided it was better to spend another year on analysis before making any final decisions," says Councillor Ross Clow, deputy chairman of the Finance and Operational Performance Committee. "However, we felt that we had to change the waste-water component now. Charging for waste-water as a percentage of a property's value has no relationship to how much waste-water the property generates," he says.

The council will spend the next twelve months analysing the three rating options available to it – land value, capital value and annual value systems. It will consult on the options before making a final decision on which system to use and how to use it.

Dear Editor

My wife and I were just about to get round to sending off the form to join the association (having lived here over 2 years) when we, like your correspondent last month, discover we no longer live in Waiatarua but Henderson Valley. So I contacted NZ Post and asked how they concluded that our house, 390 metres up a mountain, could be classed as a valley. Below is their reasoning.

"As a part of the overhaul of the post coding system in New Zealand, New Zealand Post has consulted with city and regional councils and emergency services to ensure we have the correct suburbs linked with the towns / cities.

In the case of the Waitakere City Council, they advised us that they have never gazetted suburbs for street addresses in the Waitakere area. So we went to the Emergency Services to ask them what suburbs they use and we also did some random sampling of mail addressed to the Henderson / Waiatarua area to find out what is common usage – which suburbs are linked to which addresses."

I have replied including the link to the website so they can see for themselves, and pointed out that as they supply a lot of the information to the big corporates and their mail outweighs our personal mail this isn't a very fair way of analyzing it.

Oh yes only our Bank and Power Company think we're in Waiatarua. Telecom, and would you believe the council, have us in Henderson!!

If like us you object to where NZ Post has relocated you I suggest you go to www.nzpost.co.nz Go to customer support and submit a question, then they might get the hint.

New Pool Safety Standard Doesn't Solve Complex Issue

Proposed new standards for pool safety released on the 19th of June by Standards New Zealand do not help solve the questions raised by such a complex issue, according to councillor Derek Battersby, chairman of the Swimming Pool Exemption committee.

"Waitakere City Council, with other territorial authorities, went to the High Court in 2004 to seek a clearer definition of the term 'immediate pool area' because of ambiguity in existing legislation," says councillor Battersby.

The judge ruled that any further interpretation of the Fencing of Swimming Pools Act should be done by Parliament, not the courts. However the judge's acknowledgment of an existing grey area in the law, which makes it difficult for both pool owners and local authorities to understand and comply with their obligations, was helpful. It was hoped this would spur some legislative action from Central Government.

"It is good to see some effort being made in response to the judgement, but it does little to answer our original questions about the issue in regards to defining barriers and areas around pools," says councillor Battersby.

The Standard, which is being developed by an expert committee of representatives from a cross-section of organisations, will limit unsupervised access to swimming pools, spas and hot tubs by establishing layers of protection for young children against the potential for drowning.

The intention in developing the Standard is to enable Parliament to consider using it as a replacement for the Schedule in the Fencing of Swimming Pool Act 1987, by way of an amendment to the Act.

Council Puts Street Litter 'Code' On Trial

Waitakere City Council is testing the new national code of practice for the distribution of unaddressed mail developed by the Marketing Association.

The code is being promoted by organisations which account for over 95% of all unaddressed mail deliveries - a group of distribution companies, retailers, magazine and newspaper publishers including New Zealand Post, Deltarg, PMP Ltd, and the New Zealand Retailers' Association.

The council has resolved to defer enforcing its own junk mail provisions of the bylaw until it has monitored and assessed the code of practice and decided whether there is a need to retain the junk mail part of the waste bylaw reviewed in 2005.

"We can bring in the bylaw at any time if there is still a problem," says Deputy Mayor Carolynne Stone.

"Further education of the advertising sector, including the real estate industry will be encouraged to promote greater awareness of letterbox stickers," she says.

The key principle of the code is to respect at all times the individual rights of the householder. It prohibits delivery of unaddressed mail to letterboxes with a sign requesting non-delivery, when the letterbox is full, or it is unsuitable for such material. An 0800 number (0800 111 081) will be operated by the Marketing Association from 7am to 7pm Monday to Friday to receive complaints about unaddressed mail delivered to a letterbox displaying a non-delivery sign, or the dumping of bulk quantities of printed material.

Letterbox signs are available from most leading hardware retailers.

The Arataki Rangers Roundup

We've had a chilly few weeks but things have been humming along, with a range of events being held around the Park.

Park staff, visitors from Head Office and members of Auckland's migrant community observed the Matarkiki (or Pleiades constellation) from the top of Pukemateko. These star clusters traditionally symbolise the best time to plant trees and prepare land for crops. The occasion was a chance to learn more about Matariki from the local tangata whenua and members of the migrant community as well as celebrate the place that we live and work in.

The wild and rainy weather delayed several planting days, but most eventually went ahead in late June. Over 200 primary school children spent mornings at the Whatipu Lodge campground and at Muriwai Regional Park planting a variety of trees with local Rangers and NZ School of Outdoor Studies students. At Pae o te Rangi, the Cascade-Kauri Rangers hosted the Visitor Services and Assets team from town for a planting day at their Pa Harekeke site. This site aims to establish a stock of flax species, which can be culturally harvested for educational and training purposes. In total, over 4000 trees were planted including pohutukawas from the Project Crimson Trust.

The Arataki Visitor Centre has been buzzing with activity since the start of the school holidays. Centre staff have been running a school holiday programme called "Geckos Galore" which involves identifying, locating and learning all about Geckos and their natural environment. Extra geckos were brought in to complement the permanent display in the centre and the programme has been a booked-out success.

The end of June also saw the departure of Jonothan Gould who has been a Ranger at the Arataki depot for over six years. He is replaced by Reg Phillips who will take over Jono's role as Senior Ranger – Recreation for the Park. Reg comes to the ARC after 17 years working for the Department of Conservation in the Rotorua area. He and his family are settling in the area and are looking forward to exploring the West.
