SETTLERS' FILM CLUB IS BORN

Despite the gales and hailstorms and the threat of a power cut the first film of the Settlers' Film Club was well attended, with an enthusiastic audience wanting more. The idea of setting up a film club came from film-maker Robin Kewell, who has recently moved from his native Cornwall. This first event was to test the water and gauge what interest there might be in a film club for the Oratia population. Judging by Saturday night's attendance and the number of e-mails and telephone calls from people who could not make it, it looks like it's "Lights, roll sound, roll camera and ACTION..."

The Glastonbury movie was shown the same weekend as this year's Festival in the UK, and weather conditions in both parts were quite similar, but at least the Oratia audience did not have the mud to contend with. The event not only provided a great night's entertainment but also raised \$250 to be donated to Water Aid.

For its first season the Settlers Film Club will be putting on four or five film events and following hot on the heels of their first screening is 'The Real Dirt on Farmer John' on Friday 18th July. WINTER FIRE SAFETY

Well, now that you have all had your chimneys swept after last month's newsletter, it's time for a few more fire safety precautions for the winter.

Remember the 'Metre Heater' rule – keep all clothing, objects, furnishings, furniture and children at least one metre away from heaters and fireplaces

Don't dry or store objects on top of your heating source

Always use a fire guard or spark guard with open fires

Remember that ashes can take up to 5 days to cool. Empty ashtrays and fireplace ashes into a metal bin and pour water over them prior to disposal

Ensure all electric heaters are in safe working order – replace frayed cords, broken plugs and faulty switches

Don't use heaters through multi-boxes (power boards)

If your gas heater does not light straight away, turn it off before you try again. Don't let the gas build up before trying to light it

Just remember the three biggest causes of fires are...men, women and children.

BANGLADESH - PART 5

The next morning, Friday 22nd February, we four intrepid travellers were up at 5.30 for breakfast then off to the station for the train trip back to Chittagong. The train of course was late and when it did arrive we had 8 minutes to locate which of the 17 carriages was ours and get us and our luggage aboard, no mean feat in the mass of humanity milling around the platform. Finally we left at 9.05 (on the 8 am train), comfortably settled in our first class carriage, which means we had a padded seat and a compartment for the four of us and Mostafa our guide. We were visited by a family of three young girls, aged 14, 8 and 3 years old, who were very keen to practice their English and entertained us by singing a local song.

We arrived in Chittagong around 5 pm and transferred to a couple of vans in which we were driven to the river for a boat cruise. I saw more boats in one place than you could imagine, literally hundreds moored in line after line, ranging from fishing boats through to cruise liners, Bangladesh style. A number had been confiscated for breaking fishing laws and were waiting to be auctioned off. Most looked to be in a dubious state of repair.

Next we were off to buy Shirley some Jandals for NZ\$1 and get Muriel, one of our travelling companion's, glasses fixed followed by a surprise visit to a local family, who turned out to be the family of Didar, the owner of Bangladesh Eco-Tours. Didar, his wife, young child, and sister live in a beautiful spacious three bedroom apartment, but have no running hot water. All water heating is done on the gas burners which probably has something to do with the fact that they have at least one power cut every day, and we moan.

On Saturday morning we set off in a landcruiser for our adventure, a bit cramped with five of us and our luggage and this was one of those times that I am happy to be on the large side as I ended up in the front seat, out of everyone's way. We had the inevitable border stop for a passport and signature check under the watchful gaze of a soldier armed with a machine gun and then a couple of minutes later it was the turn of the Police border patrol. At this point we saw our first 'Welcome to Bandarban' sign, which is where we were heading, so a little buzz of excitement went through the group. Mind you, the excitement waned after spending quite some time in the local town waiting for our Police escort although we did get to have lunch at a local restaurant. Finally we set off accompanied by four policemen in another landcruiser, reaching the river at 3.30 pm after travelling over dusty, rough roads. We then had a peaceful, serene trip of about an hour up the river to our destination, passing riverbanks covered in crops of tobacco, cabbages and mustard plus long boats used to move logs with these boats also serving as home to the operators.

We were met by porters which is just as well for Muriel, who is 74 and has three bags, as the climb is uphill to the village and then further uphill to our host. Our host family consists of a husband and wife, their three and a half year old son, and the husband's mother and sister, living in a bamboo house which was effectively one room, divided by a curtain to form living and sleeping areas with cooking carried out on a deck at the rear. The toilet was the most evil smelling, squat long drop you can imagine, although it was fortunately some distance from the house and my first thought was how can I avoid using it for the two days of our stay. The village, which is called Ruma, consists mainly of pineapple plants, lemon and other fruit trees and has thirty-five 35 families whose thirty-two children attend the local two teacher school.

The people are very religious and we finally ate dinner after a grace of some ten minutes, which was held in total silence. Dinner was served on a mat on the floor with none of the women joining us. After this thin mattresses were brought out to be our beds for the night, placed on the floor of bamboo poles with pigs and chooks running around underneath.

Next morning, Sunday, we were woken from a very fitful sleep by the Muslim call to prayer, chickens clucking and pigs snorting. We really were experiencing local life. After breakfast we headed off on foot to visit the local nearby Bawm tribe and one and half hours later we arrived to find that they, all twelve families, were at church, so we made ourselves comfortable in the head man's house to await their return. Around a tree outside Turmeric tubers were drying – they look just like root ginger. Upon the return of the villagers we were invited to partake of tea and cookies and during this Rosemary, our other travelling companion, visited the loo. She came back to report that it was clean and odourless, which was the solution to the problem of my hanging on for two days.

After exchanging pleasantries we headed off to the next village, little knowing what lay ahead!






