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# EARLIER TIMES IN WAIATARUA

In 1939 and '40, a father and son were cutting teatree (manuka and kanuka) for firewood, on the ridge almost opposite the top of the Kauri Loop Road (but lower and which falls to the north). They were said to have let their fire, lit for tea, get away. That dry weather fire burned their cut branches and continued almost to Bendall's Lane, and included a house on the next ridge west. Sorry, it was too far away for any fire fighters to show up and a nasty war was on taking men. Water, in a small pipe, wouldn't reach there either.

We had plenty of lovely fruit, home-grown, before the possums came from out west. They robbed the good fruit, unripe fruit, leaves and the bark, in that order, so the trees tended to die. Since the last blitz on possums, I saw one in daylight on our driveway in August 2010.

Young Mr Abbott, young lovely Miss Matthews and the respected Miss Louisa A Garvey taught about 8-14 of us in the hired Nihotupu church, about 400 metres east of the junction of West Coast and Forest Hill roads. Some of the vertical boarding on the church was pitsawn (by hand). Our playground was bare subsoil. Can you imagine the trouble small cars had, coming from Tui Crescent, over loose metal and a few large rocks to meet Forest Hill Road? Anything like a fully-laden Austin 7, which had four seats and a small motor, had great difficulty. Momentum was lost in the wiggles at both ends of that stretch.

From about 1910, Andy Lloyd ran coaches on largely mud roads in winter, from Glen Eden Rail to Karekare. It took most of a day, in-

cluding getting 'stuck in the mud' four times between the railway and Piha Road when in 1915 my mother (then a young lady) took the journey. From the early 1920s, "Lloydy" ran his taxi from the Red Sheds opposite no. 853 West Coast Road. That's now an old building but still red. Andy sold petrol too.

Can any reader tell me where the first private telephone line went? It was into a holiday home owned by Jock Parkinson - the original of Parkinson's Lookout- straight through the bush from where young I guess young Lyndsay Whittle may have been told about it. I was.

I have seen Potters Stream come to the top waterfall about 1.2 metres square, go through the road's 900mm pipes and travel 20 metres horizontally and uncontained whilst falling a measured 12 m, down the lower waterfall. Water went about 5 metres a second then. Very heavy and big hardrocks tended to thunder past, within the muddy waters. Pieces of old hard trees have come down and blocked the culvert's 400mm pipes twice during concentrated downpours.

How many know that the old volcanoes (by the trig above old Forest Hill Rd) blew out big hard rocks which landed about half a kilometre away, well beyond Tui Crescent - in rear of 833.

There was a very light snowfall in the frost, on what is now Scenic Drive and 849 West Coast Roads in 1939.

#### To Drink Or Not To Drink!

#### The Question:

I had a plumber to fix the waterworks (the pipe had broken from the tank and burnt out the pump) but he said although the water looks clean that my tank is very dirty and should be cleaned as he would not drink from it. Can you help... such as, do we know how our locals fare with this and do you know of any reputable and good priced tank cleaners? I guess I will have to have it refilled... Nadine.

#### The Answer:

I have lived on Waiatarua tank water almost all my life and neither my family nor I have ever had a stomach complaint as a result. So I have become a believer in building tolerances to bacteria etc over time rather than removing them suddenly from our lives so that we have no natural resistance when we do encounter them elsewhere. My tanks have often contained a large build-up of decayed leaf matter, but it is not harmful to humans and I can assure you that when we removed the nine inches of kowhai leaf skeletons from my father's tanks the water did not taste as sweet and beautiful for years until it had built back up.

Remember that our rain predominantly comes in from the west, bearing no smog or city air, so the worst we Waiataruans have to fear is bird poop which hasn't managed to kill off anyone I know to date. City people love to scaremonger us with tales of floating possums but I've yet to find a dead possum capable of crawling through the necessary downpipes. It's an urban myth at best.

Here's what I would do in Nadine's position if she is worried. Get an under bench filter fitted in the kitchen for city guests. Do nothing about the tank until next winter. In July, drain it, don a wetsuit, climb inside and bucket out the leaf buildup until she can hose down the dregs. To drain the tank completely the easiest way is to fill a garden hose, plug both ends and drop one down to the floor, run the remainder down the section until it is well below the tank, open the outside end first then the tank end. Natural siphon effect will drain it to the floor without having to get a mouthful of water. If you don't want to do this yourself, pay a student to or a local DIY person.

Then wait two days for the tank to refill - it is in a rain forest after all.

If paranoia has set in, buy some tank water treatment from the hardware store and use on the first fill. Then fit a first flush system to your gutters or repeat this exercise some time after the kids have grown up and left home. Cheers - Brett.

#### Fire Safety - Family BBQ Safety Tips

With daylight saving giving us more evening sun, many of us will be using the extra hours to fire up the barbecue and get family and friends together.

- Supervise children around grills. If using a public grill, close the barbecue fence if there is one.
- Keep matches and lighters away from children. Teach children to report any loose matches or lighters to an adult immediately.
- Before using a grill, check the connection between the gas tank and the fuel line. Test for leaks using soapy water. Do not overfill the gas tank.
- Dispose of hot coals properly douse them with plenty of water, and stir them to ensure that the fire is out. Never place them in plastic, paper or wooden containers they can take up to five days to cool.
- Never grill/barbecue in enclosed areas carbon monoxide could be produced and can be fatal.
- Make sure your barbecue is completely extinguished when finished.
- Alcohol and fire don't mix Know your limits and drink responsibly.
