# The Broadband Saga

I love living in Waiatarua! We

live in a unique environment and we are privileged to live here.

As a young man, many weekends I drove in and around Auckland visiting and checking virtually every area with the specific purpose of selecting where I would live and call home. In 1968 I moved into my first house in Quinns Road Waiatarua and I have lived almost continuously at various addresses on this road ever since. The reasons I was attracted to Waiatarua were many and varied. The invigorating and fresh morning air, the lush rainforest vegetation, the many native birds that visit or inhabit the privacy without fences or barriers, the close proximity to the west coast beaches and the Centennial Park, and possibly most of all the beautiful and expansive views. Views that change with the time of day, that change with the weather and change with the seasons. Looking across the lights of Auckland at night I feel connected to the vigor and life of Auckland but somehow separate and protected. I started and based my business in Henderson and until I sold to retire in 2000 I could drive to and from my work in 10 minutes and not one set of traffic lights! Joy!

Of course we pay a price for the privilege of living here. We accept the lack of local amenities, we tolerate the sparsity of public transport, we complain about the poorly engineered and dangerous roads and in the more elevated part of Waiatarua we pay the costs resulting from no water reticulation or sewer. In local politics and government Titirangi is heard, Oratia has a voice but despite the good efforts and commitment of some motivated people Waiatarua remains "lost in the hills to the West". Now technology appears to add to this list. Many of us PAY for Broadband but do we get it?

My present provider is Telecom. Last year I became so unhappy with slow download speeds I decided to try Vodafone. I explained to a Vodafone agent that if I was to change to their service the change over would need to be almost "seamless". Once again with commercial involvements and connecting to these from home I did not want to risk being without service for even a short period of time. I was assured and I signed up to change. Then the agent advised I should also change my landline phone to Vodafone and there were benefits if my Sky TV account was also moved to Vodafone. I agreed. Two days later with no prior warning Telecom disconnected my Broadband. For around a month I was without service. My landlines were swapped and my Sky account swapped but not the Broadband. During this time I received several misleading and untrue messages from Vodafone. Some advised connection dates that came and went. (During this I had to purchase rather expensive Mobile T sticks to stay in touch with the internet and my emails.) Several times I spoke to Vodafone operators only to be eventually told don't take any notice of the Vodafone email messages because they are sent out "automatically". One operator even said "you should not believe

what you have been told before but believe me now". Finally after learning that due to "limitations" at the local exchange the Vodafone service would required me to install another landline to my house, together with a growing suspicion that the Vodafone service might be nothing more than a rebranding of the same service I had previously had from Telecom I told Vodafone to "forget it". I went back to Telecom and they "very kindly" agreed to accept me back as a customer but only after a further wait for reconnection. Another two weeks later I was back with Telecom and unhappy with both companies. Several months later I am still trying to sort outVodafone charges for the "disconnection" of the service I never got.

Since returning to Telecom the speed of my connection has continued to worsen. I have discussed this with other people in Waiatarua and their experience is similar or worse than mine. For several weeks I have regularly checked download speed using the free "Speed Test" on the Consumer site. The results have varied considerably. On the afternoon of June 2 it reached a wonderful 4.54 Mbps but this was exceptional and typically it has been much slower. Around 8 PM each night it consistently drops to around 0.18 to 0.36 Mbps. I am not technically competent in this area and my recent research into broad band speeds has not helped. Wikipedia says broad band speeds was never formally defined but it does say DSL broad band is usually between 256 Kb/s and 40 Mbit/s. These measurements employ a "binary system" but I believe 256 kb/s is about .256 Mbps so my download is dropping below the bottom threshold. At these speeds I sometimes must wait several minutes for even a simple page to open and occasionally I am unable to even open a website.

The purpose of my letter is to suggest that the residence of Waiatarua who are experiencing similar problems collectively approach Telecom (and Vodafone) to improve the service to this area. Individual complaints don't seem to carry much weight but together we might get some attention. If there is sufficient support maybe the WRRA might coordinate this.

There is an alternative to ADSL for those with line of sight to the Waikumete cemetery. We ditched the ADSL a year ago for a wireless broadband connection from compassnet.co.nz.

The connection may only be 2Mbps, but it's 2Mbps all day every day, even during the mad evening rush. That's 200kB/s downloads while our neighbours are struggling to make 30kB/sec with their ADSL. Our only regret is that we didn't make the switch sooner.

#### Winter

With winter here, please ensure that your chimneys are swept. Ashes removed from fire-places can take up to five days to cool. Always place in a metal container and well clear of your home. Remember THE METRE HEATER RULE, Keep furniture, clothes and curtains at least one metre from heaters and fire-places.

#### Smoke Alarms Save Lives!!!

Recently the brigade was called to a smoke alarm activating from an alarm monitoring company at a private address. On arrival at the address the brigade was met by the occupants who stated that they had been woken from their sleep by the smoke alarm going off. The alarm was connected to their home security alarm and monitored by their alarm company, so the fire brigade turned out automatically. The lower level of the home had a strong smell of electrical burning and smoke. After some investigation a faulty/overheating home entertainment unit was discovered to be the cause. This was isolated and dealt with by the brigade.

Had the home not been fitted with working smoke alarms this may have lead to the faulty unit catching fire and causing considerable damage to the home and/or putting lives at risk.
