Hello Waiatarua!!

For Christmas in 2003 I received Michael King's Pengiun classic, "History of New Zealand." In the front, part of the personal message is "...to ultimately understand." I never finished it. To be honest, I barely started it.

This time around I'm comitted and ploughing through. In the first chapter I was shocked to discover that New Zealand residents, Polynesian first, and then the rest have earned our country the distinction of the most destructive to the natural environment of any recorded human settlement of a nation. Polynesian settlers eliminated over 30 species, mainly to eat. And this was without guns, bow and arrow or even boomerangs. Since the latter British colonisation and with more advanced technology, together we've wiped out another 100 or so species.

All around the world we pride ourselves on our evolving civilisation. But in our extremely short time walking upright on this planet so far we've wrecked havoc. In Paris some awful stuff recently occurred, but the city of love also saw unprecedented international agreement to try and reverse that the damage we've done.

I've loved the onset of summer in this glorious rainforest, my favourite moments being the translucency of the bush in a warm, misty, but sunny day.

But I've also been aware of the several crises occurring in Waiatarua

Bus service - we are to lose our public bus service this year. Broadband - the government confirmed that Waiatarua is

outside the areas that will receive Ultra Fast Broadband. Bugger! Some of us still hardly have dialup speeds. And TV on demand means that the existing connections slow many times a week.

Weeds - the 5 or 6 invasive weeds around Waiatarua continue their total destruction of all native plants they come across. Kauri dieback - the council are threatening those of us with Kauri on our sections with total responsibility for control of dieback disease. For one of our neighbours I heard this week it is adding \$50,000 to their building costs. At up to \$5,000 arborist fees for removal of a big tree, would you want to have to pay this?

Rural rates - Yes, we pay some rural levies in our rates. International research shows that creating Super Cities shows that for urban and suburban centers costs are reduced and services improve. But the analysts in town don't live rurally; we are facing unfair increases that we shouldn't have to bear.

Civil Defence - Our biggest risk around here is forest fire. Often too wet, but they DO HAPPEN. We've been downgraded by Civil Defence as not needing a plan, even though we've done most of the work to create one.

The biggest crisis of all right now for the Waiatarua Ratepayers and Residents Association is that our executive committee numbers have dwindled through attrition and we barely have the quorum to allow us to make decisions. And when we make decisions, there are not enough of us to do justice to intiatives to address the issues I speak of. We need your help!!! Even if you only have a small amount of time, a bit of passion can go a long way. At a minimum, please join your household up as a WRRA member.

Then, come and join us at our AGM where you can present yourself as a candidate for the committee, or just share your ideas and meet a neighbour or two. If you're unsure, send me an email or give me a call. I have a lot of ideas, but unless we join together we can achieve little. Come along, be informed and maybe lend a hand.
