Hello Waiatarua!

It's been a couple of months since I last wrote, partly because of some time away in Bali, a place I never thought I'd go. Just somewhere Kiwi and Aussie tourists flee winter for surf holidays. Partly true.

Also true and what's stayed with me is the care and consideration Balinese show towards each other. Bali is around 80-90% Hindu/Buddhist and the belief in karma is strong and pervasive. There is often little or no crime. Disadvantaged are cared for. Kindness is everywhere. To borrow words from a friend I made there, Jacqui O'Connor:

[The Balinese] "...are kind and smile often. They are generous and warm. They take time and care in all they do. They don't rush. They work hard. They do even the most mundane tasks, with pride, dedication and authentic connection with themselves, with others and with something beyond humanity."

And on scooter riding styles:

"...you can balance all your necessities at one time and taking risks without hesitation pays off. That it's ok to cross the line, break the rules and go the wrong way. That courtesy gets you places faster".

The proviso in all this is that you trust that those sharing the physical or meta-physical road with you to actually care about you and your journey as well. I watched fellow tourists become irate, frustrated, and even shouting, yet locals stayed relaxed and smiling, possibly empathising with the temper in front of them. It's all about Karma.

While away, I was reminded of how much DNA we share with trees. I returned to more news about the mighty Kauri dying horrible deaths in our neighbourhood and only in areas where we humans go to visit them, and after we chopped so many of them out for important things like railway sleepers and floor boards. Leask tells of life and work in a prison.

How threatening could life in a seemingly peaceful commune be? "See You In September" by Charity Norman explores this theme. Hitchhiking while on holiday in New Zealand, a young English woman is picked up by some commune members and taken to their remote location. It is tranquil and she soon willingly becomes part of the daily life there. Her parents in England fight this all the way. Read this thriller!

Do you like to listen to your music on vinyl? This novel is set in London in the 80's and Rachel Joyce's new book "The Music Shop" centres around an area where life is changing and that includes CDs. instead of records. Most people in the area do not want change to happen and fight to cling to their familiar environment and way of life. Tear down the shops and build houses. Never!

Can you imagine the effect of seeing your mother carried screaming to an ambulance and off to an asylum? In "The Woman in the Wood" by Lesley Pearse, fifteen year old twins Maisy and Duncan Mitcham experience just that. They are then sent to live with their grandmother in the New Forest. In the course of exploring their new home they come across a strange woman living rough in a shack. Then Duncan disappears and it seems other boys have also met the same fate, but their bodies have been found. Not so in Duncan's case. Maisy takes it upon herself to solve the mystery.

We are open Mon, Wed & Friday mornings from 9:30 – 12:30 (term time) and have room for some new families. We offer three free visits and do a wicked coffee and scone. Here's what we got up to this week:



On Monday the children got their worm farm up and running. The children transferred the worms into the worm farm in little pinches or big handfuls! Next we went inside and cut up some vegetables for our pasta sauce (for one of our expectant mums). The food scraps went to feed our hungry worms. These experiences provide opportunities for the children to explore science and nature, trying something new (taking a risk holding worms!), team work, taking turns, a sense of community and supporting others.



On Wednesday the children spent a rainy morning mixing potions on the deck. Lots of messy play with ice, flour, shaving foam, glitter and paint! Children learnt about texture, mixing colours, science concepts — chemical reactions, cause & effect and working together.

This is the work of the Waiatarua Weed Group, one of 4 bags we filled on our last day out, this one at Sandy's place. The black bag will suffocate the invasive weeds we put in it and those that drive down West Coast Road will notice that as the weeks and months go by it will continue to shrink until it only contains a few barrow loads of rich soil.


