Possible Progress

Wayne Edwards, our man on the spot reports:

"The immediate focus of Auckland Transport was on some short-term measures. They are looking at raising awareness of the intersection, the traffic controls which apply, vehicle speeds and the correct lane for motorists to use, especially for drivers approaching from the blind corner east of Scenic Drive and from the west on Piha Road. These include stop signs and destination signage, double yellow no-passing lines and speed reduction measures. These have now been installed.

The long-term options under consideration include a roundabout at the Piha Rd / Scenic Dr intersection. However AT say the topography, the constraints of the intersection and the unique nature of the Waitakere Ranges Heritage Area make this very difficult. A roundabout would be an expensive solution and when it comes to funding it will need to be measured against other traffic safety priorities across the region.

Since many accidents have gone unreported they are also talking to the Police about the reporting procedures and processes for crashes at this intersection.

As a resident of Quinns Rd familiar with the difficulty and danger of exiting Quinns Rd when there is high traffic volumes I have some doubts that the newly installed compulsory stop on Quinns Rd will assist."

This month we have a very good selection of new books.

Time & Tide by Larain Day tells the history of the Pelorus Mail Boat. Mail, provisions, livestock and even vehicles have been delivered around the Marlborough Sounds for 100 years by boat. The original operators ran the service for 55 years. When they started there were few roads into the sounds and the boat was a vital link. The service still operates 3 days per week and up to 7 in the summer. Very popular with tourists.

Educated Is a memoir by Tara Westover. She grew up in Idaho, the child of parents who distrusted the government and all it's agencies – schools, hospitals etc. The family were Mormons but beyond that the parents were isolationists and survivalists. Ammunition and supplies were hoarded for the end of the world and the children did not go to school. Tara, desperate to learn everything, educated herself to a level to gain entrance to Brigham Young University. That was her first experience of a classroom. She eventually earned a Ph.D from Cambridge University.

Jacob's Room Is Full Of Books is, indeed a book about books. Susan Hill spent a year reading/rereading the large number of books she owned. As the year passes she muses on the books, related thoughts and the passing seasons. A literary memoir well worth reading.

Environmental Corner

9th June the weed bin will return and to make your hard work a little more rewarding we will be up there I I-2 with a sausage sizzle and a refreshing drink (bring a vessel for a drink if possible). There will also be some experts on site for some advice!

Kaka have been seen in Titirangi, flying in the canopy looking for kauri seed no doubt. Keep an eye out for this rare sight and let us know if you get lucky!

Weeds of the Month

This time of year is a fantastic one for walking around your garden and getting any gorse or wattle brush seedlings before they bed in for winter. Both are part of the pea family, grow quickly, are hardy in even the harshest conditions and unfortunately feature long-lived seeds. On the plus side both can be used to regenerate native bush, so if you have vast areas where these plants have already established, it may be more beneficial to look at planting native seeds (or seedlings) under them and allowing the area to regenerate, however their easily transportable seeds will blow in the wind, potentially bothering your neighbours! To get rid of seedlings, small ones should be easy to pull out by hand with their roots, while larger species will need to be cut at the base and brushed with triclopyr (carefully read the instructions). Make sure its not going to rain for at least 4-6 hours.

Description:

Gorse is pretty unique looking, with sharp spiky leaves, whereas wattle brush seedlings can look like many other wattles. Both plants once established will flower from May until August, with green-yellow flowers.
