Thursday, 18 April, 7.30pm

World Animal Protection is a global animal welfare organisation, established more than fifty years ago, working in more than fifty countries. Their work focuses on animals in farming, in the wild, in communities, in disasters, and oceans. This entails attention to animals used for entertainment, as pets, in captivity, in tourism, trying to stem the tide of exploitation for gratuitous human pursuits. There's work responding to disasters, threats to animal (and human welfare) like rabies, and intensive farming. World Animal Protection attends to areas where the scale and intensity of animal suffering is the greatest, working at both the cause of problems and their solutions.

Work in NZ includes engagement with the farming industry, against rodeo, for Maui and Hector's dolphins, and addresses NZ tourist behaviour overseas which can encourage cruel attractions like elephant riding, tiger and sloth selfies and swimming with captive dolphins.

Christine Rose is a Campaign Advisor for World Animal Protection here in NZ and will present on how the organisation localises efforts here, to help end animal cruelty around the world.

Vacancies for Treasurer and Financial Book-Keeper

The WRRA have two roles that are vacant and need filling as soon as possible.

The first, for Treasurer, is a volunteer position on the Executive Committee.

The Treasurer's key responsibilities are:

- 1. Financial governance activities, including banking, for the WRRA.
- 2. Supporting the Executive Committee in funding agreed activities; which could involve applying for funding or causing funding

applications to happen.

- 3. Setting priorities with Book-Keeper.
- 4. Monthly reporting of accounts to the Executive Committee.
- 5. Engaging Auditor at year end.
- 6. Processing and maintaining membership records.

Six Eggcellent Easter Activities for Kids

Hold an Easter Egg Hunt

Whether it's indoors or outdoors, a treasure egg hunt or hunting by names, this will surely bring out the laughter in your house and give you a glimpse of the competitive side of your children!

This is the ultimate in classic Easter activities for kids!

Make an Easter Wreath

Get out your glue gun and stick some painted plastic eggs to a wire or faux wreath. Then, place some stuffed bunnies so that they appear to be sitting facing each other at the bottom of the wreath. Glue them into place as well and hang the holiday decoration on your front door.

Make Easter Biscuits

Bake some biscuits together and decorate them with Easter themes using brightly coloured icing sugar.

Make Chocolate Nests

To make chocolate nests:

Add 100g of butter, I tbsp cocoa powder, 50g milk chocolate buttons and 75g of golden syrup in a bowl.

Microwave on high for 1.5mins and mix together.

Crumble 4 Shredded Wheat over the bowl and mix with rest of ingredients.

Place a generous spoonful in each of 12 muffin/cupcake cases (the nests).

Press the centre of each nest down slightly to form a dip and place 3 chocolate mini eggs in each dip.

Chill for 30 minutes before serving.

Hold an Egg and Spoon Race

Let all the race participants decorate their own hard boiled egg with paint, glitter etc. Then hand them all a soup spoon and let them race off on the predetermined course. The winner will be the one who reaches the finish line first without dropping their egg.

Go to the Royal Easter Show

The Royal Easter Show is taking place at the ASB Showgrounds in Greenlane, Auckland on the 18th – 22nd of April 2019. Entry to the show is FREE!

The Royal Easter Show had its beginnings 176 years ago, beginning as a purely agricultural event to help the fledgling colony develop a sound farming economy. The first A&P show was held in 1843. The aims of the event were to demonstrate excellence in agriculture and animal husbandry, and to promote the breeding of stud animals to establish and increase the farm animal gene pool in the emerging colony.

Easter French Toast

2 eggs
I/2 cup milk
I tsp vanilla extract
60g butter
4 hot cross buns, halved

sliced banana, to serve blueberries, to serve maple syrup, to serve

Method

- 1. In a large, shallow bowl, whisk together eggs, milk and vanilla.
- 2. Dip halved hot cross buns into egg mixture, turning to coat.

- 3. Heat butter in a large frying pan over a medium heat. Cook buns in two batches for 2-3 minutes each side, until golden.
- 4. Serve buns topped with banana and blueberries. Drizzle with maple syrup.

Tip: Any leftover hot cross buns can be put in an airtight, resealable bag and frozen.




